#### INTRODUCTION

Mid-Cumberland Community Action Agency offers the Community Services Block Grant, Head Start/ Early Head Start, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, the Weatherization Assistance Program, and the Tennessee Emergency Food Assistance Program in a multi-county region in Tennessee. The service area includes the following counties: Cannon, Cheatham, Robertson, Rutherford, Sumner, Trousdale, Williamson, and Wilson. The agency offers services through outreach offices and Head Start/ Early Head Start sites located in each county. Only Head Start/ Early Head Start services are provided in Cannon County.

This Community Assessment is a tool used to make better program decisions, to determine the types of services most needed by low-income communities, households, and individuals, and to help set long- and short-term program and agency objectives. MCCAA staff study the most important changes in the communities and counties served on a regular basis. However, the Community Assessment is the formal and far-reaching process performed every three years and updated annually.

From its inception, MCCAA has pursued and constantly demonstrated its ability to develop, implement and administer effective human service programs in its efforts to promote self-sufficiency. MCCAA's administrative and fiscal capabilities are apparent through increased revenues and corresponding program expansions the agency has experienced throughout its history.

MCCAA is a multi-county CAP agency with programs including Tennessee Emergency Food Assistance Program, Weatherization Assistance Program, a multifaceted Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), and Low-Income Homes Energy Assistance (LIHEAP). Inter-agency referral and networking is a key organizational practice.

## Mid-Cumberland Community Action Agency (MCCAA)

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MCCAA was organized in 1971 to provide social services to five Middle Tennessee counties: Rutherford, Sumner, Trousdale, Williamson and Wilson. In 1982 and 1990 Cheatham and Robertson Counties were added to this service area. Cannon was added in 1992 to provide Head Start services.

MCCAA has an integrated management and organizational structure, as well as effective communication systems and collaboration with governing bodies, staff and community partners. The MCCAA organizational structure supports the program objectives with a design that is dynamic and based on a strong commitment to provide the highest quality of services to low-income communities, households and individuals.

## METHODOLOGY: THE COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT PROCESS

This Community Assessment offers detailed information about numerous topics, as well as an examination of Mid-Cumberland Community Action Agency's service area's strengths and barriers relative to socio-economic wellness for low-income communities, households, and individuals. This is a comprehensive collection and analysis of key indicators to evaluate the needs and characteristics of eligible MCCAA clients and low-income communities. This report not only fulfills the CSBG and Head Start/ Early Head Start federal requirements, but it becomes an integral part of the agency's planning, implementation, and evaluation process.

Every three years the agency conducts a comprehensive collection and analysis of key indicators to evaluate the needs and characteristics of eligible client's and low-income communities. Every year after the comprehensive analysis, a follow-up assessment becomes the latest baseline to identify current community needs, design new plans, choose additional community partners, develop strategic collaborations, evaluate progress of past interventions, and make relevant decisions about program improvement changes expeditiously.

The Community Assessment methodology focuses on different levels of analysis. The following components of the Community Assessment represent key methods utilized to complete this report:

1. *Review of most recent secondary data on indicators that have an impact on the program and its service delivery model(s). (Below we offer a rationale and brief description for the use of Census Data: American Community Survey 5-year Estimates).*

The Community Assessment includes all the necessary and required topics established by the Community Services Block Grant and Head Start/ Early Head Start program. Data collection and analysis may include, but is not limited to, the programming report data, client application data, outcomes data, census data, local and state planning department reports, state department data, local interagency committee reports, and social service providers.

2. *Development and utilization of additional assessments, to include data observed or collected directly from first-hand experience using such methods as attitude / perception surveys, key informant interviews, community forums and/or focus group interviews.*

MCCAA staff identifies and puts into action other methods to collect data from different sources and service areas. These include written assessment surveys, interviews with key informants, and other telephone interviews with experts and individuals. In addition to surveying the target population, the *Community Needs Survey* is administered to members of the five key sectors, as identified in Organizational Standard 2.2: community based organizations, faith-based organizations, private sector, public sector, and educational intuitions. MCCAA staff also identify and provides names of key informants

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to participate in interviews that will provide additional support to secondary data analysis findings. These key informant interviews support data findings, generate important implications and connections to program needs, and serve to generate strategic discussions in relation to program improvement based on empirical data (see [Appendix B: Community Needs Assessment Survey Results](#)).

**Census Data: American Community Survey 5-year Estimate.** A predominant data source (for population and poverty statistics) used for this report is the [U.S. Census Bureau's](#) 2021 American Community Survey, 5-year Estimate. *"The American Community Survey (ACS) is an ongoing survey that provides data every year -- giving communities the current information they need to plan investments and services. Information from the survey generates data that help determine how more than \$450 billion in federal and state funds are distributed each year."*

*In order to support local governments, communities, and federal programs, data was collected on the following topics: age and sex, race and ethnicity, family and relationships, income and benefits, health insurance, education, veteran status, disabilities, where you work and how you get there, and where you live and how much you pay for some essentials.*

Figure 1 is a chart describing the difference between 1-year, 3-year and 5-year estimates. Although the 5-year estimate is the "least current" data set, it is the *most reliable*, and it allows for comparison and analysis of all counties, townships, or census tracts, which are geographic levels necessary when conducting an analysis of various populations, and/or other needs and indicators for Head Start programs.

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## SERVICE AREA DATA

### Geography

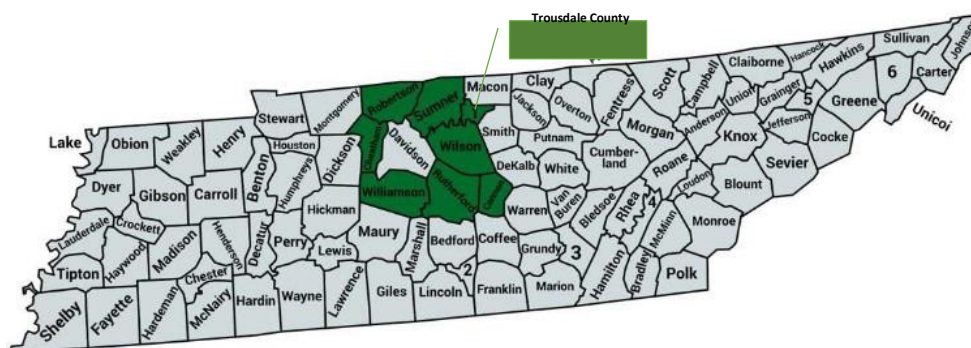
Tennessee is located in the southeastern United States, bordered by Virginia, North Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Missouri, and Kentucky. Tennessee's capital and second largest city is Nashville; Nashville has surpassed Memphis in becoming the most populated city in the state. (Fig 2). Tennessee has a total area of 42,217 square miles, which makes it the 34<sup>th</sup> largest state; with a population of 6.7 million, Tennessee is the 16<sup>th</sup> most densely populated state in the country.



The state is divided into six geographic regions: Blue Ridge, the Appalachian Ridge and Valley Region, the Cumberland Plateau, the Highland Rim, the Nashville Basin, and the Gulf Coastal Plain. The state is divided into 95 counties, with Shelby County as the largest, most populous county, and Picket County as the smallest, least populous.

## Population and Demographic Data

### Population Growth and Change

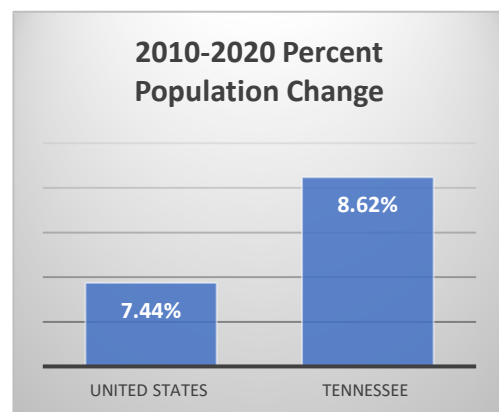


Figure 3: Population Change 2010-2020 (U.S. Census)

Based on the 2020 Census, the total population of Tennessee was 6,772,268, up 8.6 percent from 6,234,968 in 2010. The population is expected to continue to grow as Tennessee is a top state for interstate migration. The population increased in each of the MCCA service area counties, with the greatest growth seen in Trousdale, Williamson, and Rutherford Counties where the population grew by 40.8, 33.4 and 29.4 percent, respectively (Table 3, Fig 3).

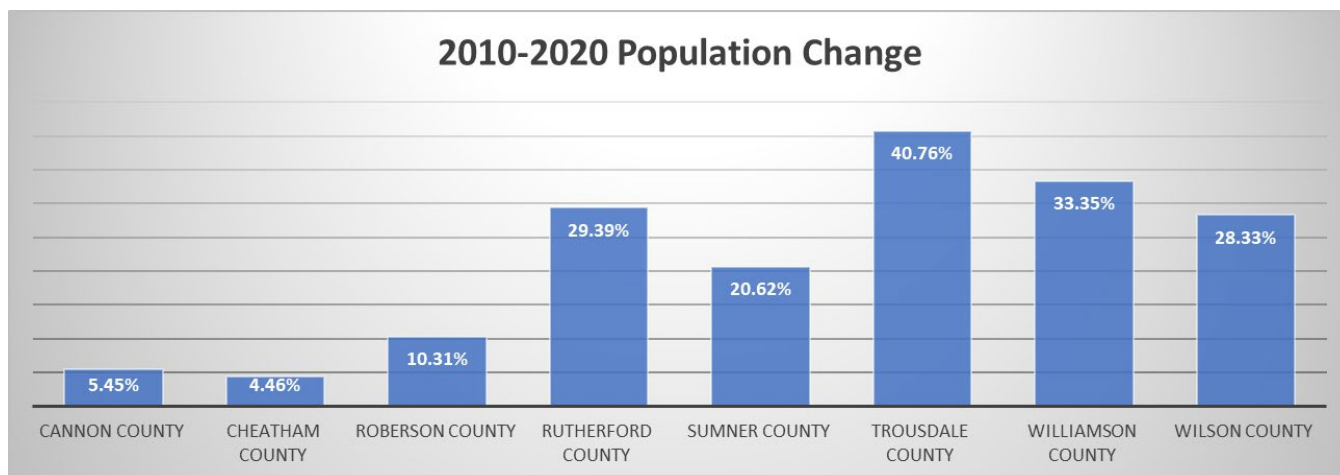


Figure 4: Population Change 2010-2020 (U.S. Census)

### Population Growth by Race/Ethnicity

Although the overall population increased by 7.44 percent in the United States from 2010 to 2020, there are significant differences in the percentage increases for different races and ethnicities. For example, in the United States from 2010 to 2020, the white population decreased by .05 percent, and the black/African American population increased by 8.3 percent. The Asian and bi-racial (two or more) populations increased by 24.5 and 68.2 percent, respectively (Fig 6, 7).

In Tennessee the bi-racial population grew the most, by 63.6 percent, followed by the Asian population, which grew by 30.5 percent. The biracial population grew by the greatest percentage in the majority of the counties in the MCCA service area, except in Cannon County, where the black/African American population grew the most. The black/African American population growth in the MCCA service area counties ranged from 7.7 percent (Robertson County) to 68.7 percent (Cannon County).

### 2010-2020 Population Growth by Race

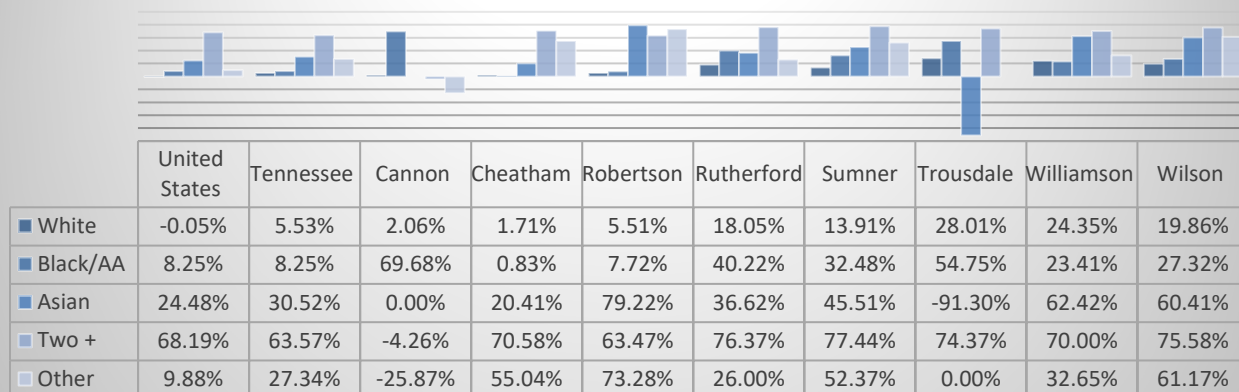


Figure 5: Percent Population Change by Race 2010-2020 (U.S. Census)

In the United States, the non-Hispanic/Latino population grew by 4.7 percent over the ten-year period, and the Hispanic/Latino population increased by 21.5 percent (Fig 8). The Hispanic/Latino population increased in all counties of the MCCA service area; Cannon and Wilson Counties experienced Hispanic/Latino population growth of 69.5 and 52.4 percent, respectively.

### 2010-2020 Population Growth by Ethnicity

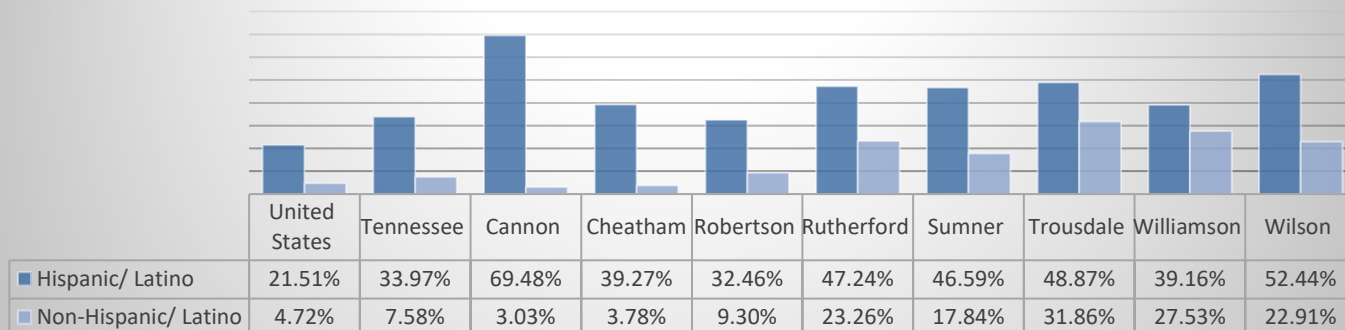


Figure 6: Percent Population Change by Ethnicity 2010-2020 (U.S. Census)

### Racial and Ethnic Characteristics

In the United States, approximately two and half out of four residents are white (68.2 percent), 12.6 percent are black/African American, 5.7 percent are Asian, and 7 percent identify as having two or more races. This represents a similar to the U.S., in Tennessee 75.8 percent of the population is white; 16.5 percent are black/African American, 1.8 percent are Asian, and 3.8 percent identify as having two or more races (Fig 9).

In each of the MCCA service area counties, the population is also predominantly white, 73.3 to 95.2 percent. Rutherford and Trousdale Counties have the highest black/African American population, 15.2 and 10.7 percent, respectively.

**The U.S. Census Bureau considers race and ethnicity to be two separate and distinct concepts.**

#### What is race?

The Census Bureau defines race as a person's self-identification with one or more social groups. An individual can report as White, Black or African American, Asian, American Indian and Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, or some other race. Survey respondents may report multiple races.

#### What is ethnicity?

Ethnicity determines whether a person is of Hispanic origin or not. For this reason, ethnicity is broken out in two categories, Hispanic or Latino and Not Hispanic or Latino. Hispanics may report as any race.

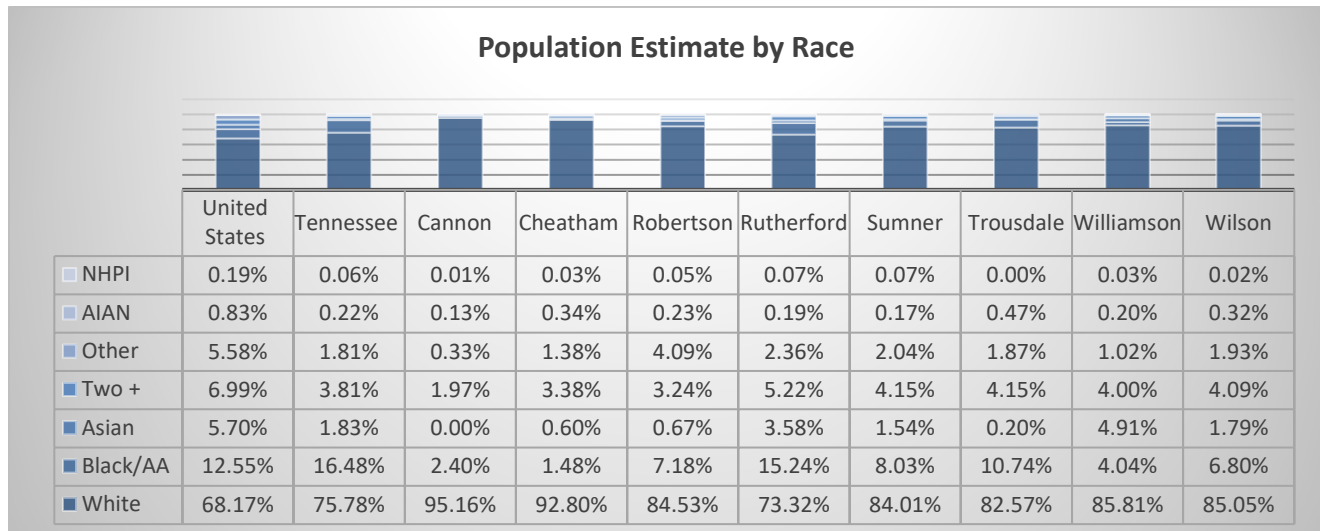


Figure 7: 2021 Population Estimate by Race (U.S. Census)

In the United States, 18.4 percent of the population is Hispanic/Latino; in Tennessee only 5.8 percent of the population is Hispanic/Latino (Fig 10). Robertson and Rutherford Counties have the highest Hispanic/Latino populations, 7.4 and 8.7 percent, respectively.

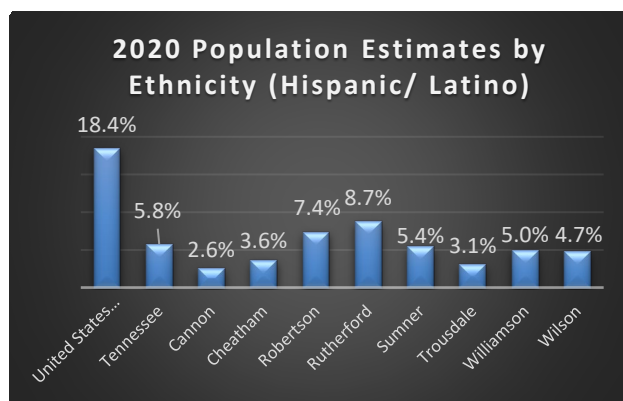


Figure 8: 2020 Population Estimate by Ethnicity (U.S. Census)

**“White”** refers to a person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa.

**“Black or African American”** refers to a person having origins in any of the Black racial groups of Africa.

**“American Indian or Alaska Native”** refers to a person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America) and who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment.

**“Asian”** refers to a person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent, including, for example, Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam.

**“Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander”** refers to a person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands.

**“Some Other Race”** includes all other responses not included in the White, Black or African American, American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, and Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander race categories described above. Respondents reporting entries such as multiracial, mixed, interracial, or a Hispanic or Latino group (for example, Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, or Spanish) in response to the race question are included in this category.

**“Hispanic or Latino”** refers to a person of Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin regardless of race.

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#### Sex and Age

U.S. Census data indicate that approximately 49.5 percent of the United States population is male, and 50.5 percent is female. This is not significantly different for Tennessee and the MCCA service area, except in Trousdale County, where ACS data indicates that the male to female ratio has shifted to 6.2:3.8 in the years between 2019-2020. The youngest residents, those below age 5, make up 5.9 percent of the United States' and Tennessee's populations, and between 5.5 and 6.4 percent of the population in the MCCA service area. The median age in Tennessee is slightly higher than for the United States overall, 38.8 years, compared with 38.4 years nationally. The median age in all counties, except Rutherford County (33.9 years) and Trousdale County (33.1), is higher than Tennessee; the MCCA service area median ranges from 33.1 to 40.8 years (Table 5).

#### Households

On average, approximately two out of three households in the United States and Tennessee are family households. Between 63.9 and 78.0 percent of households in the MCCA service area are family households, with Williamson County reporting the highest proportion of family households, 78.0 percent (Table 6).

Of the 2.6 million households in Tennessee, 54.6 percent are married family households with children under age 18, 17.8 percent are single male households with children under age 18, and 27.6 percent are single female households with children under age 18.

A **family** is a group of two people or more (one of whom is the householder) related by birth, marriage, or adoption and residing together; all such people (including related subfamily members) are considered as members of one family. The number of families is equal to the number of family households. However, the count of family members differs from the count of family household members because family household members include any non-relatives living in the household.

A **family household** is a household maintained by a householder who is in a family (as defined above) and includes any unrelated people (unrelated subfamily members and/or secondary individuals) who may be residing there. The number of family households is equal to the number of families. The count of family household members differs from the count of family members, however, in that the family household members include all people living in the household, whereas family members include only the householder and his/her relatives. See the definition of family.

A **nonfamily household** consists of a householder living alone (a one-person household) or where the householder shares the home exclusively with people to whom he/she is not related.

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Figure 11 illustrates the proportion of family households with children under age 18. Trousdale County reports the highest proportion of total households that are single male households with children under age 18, 22 percent. Cannon County reports the highest proportion of total households that are single female households with children under age 18, 27.1 percent.

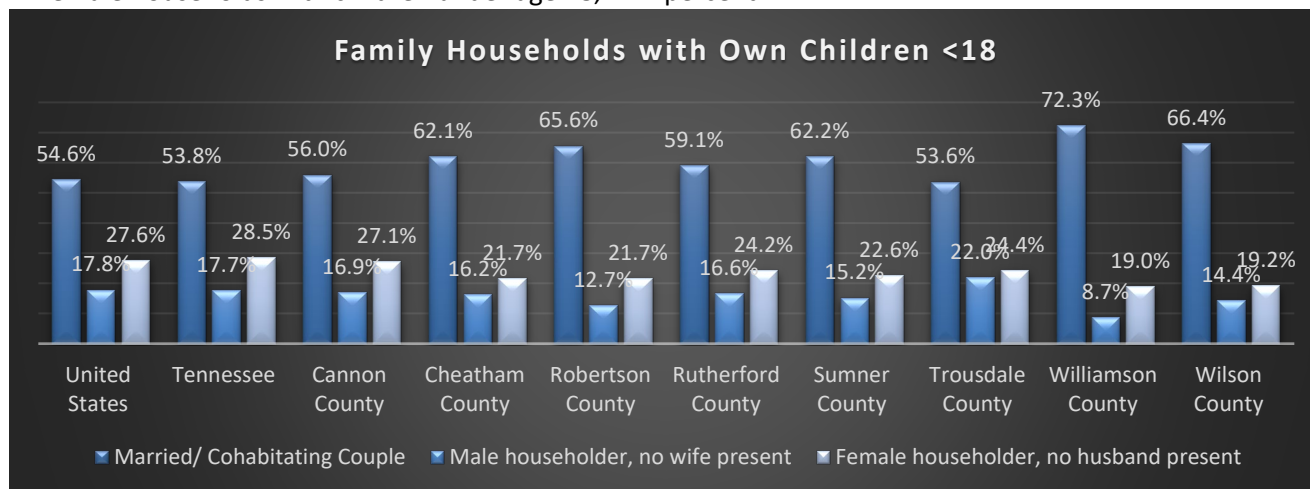


Figure 9: Households by Type (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)

### Grandparents and Grandchildren

An increasing number of children in the United States live in households headed by a grandparent. This trend is due to increasing numbers of single parent families, the high rate of divorce, teenage pregnancies, incarcerations of parents, substance abuse by parents, illness, disability or death of parents, parental abuse or neglect. In many of these homes, neither of the child's biological parents is present. In most cases, children taken care of by grandparents move in with them as infants or preschoolers and remain with them for five years or more. These grandparents are a diverse group ranging in ages from their 30s to their 70s. Many grandparents are ready to simplify their lives and slow down. Giving that up and taking over the responsibilities of being a primary caregiver again can stir up many feelings including grief, anger, loss, resentment and possibly guilt. The transition can be very stressful and the emotional and financial burdens can be significant. Culture shock at having to deal with children and adolescents of a different generation can be great. Grandparent-headed households have a significantly higher poverty rate than other kinds of family units.

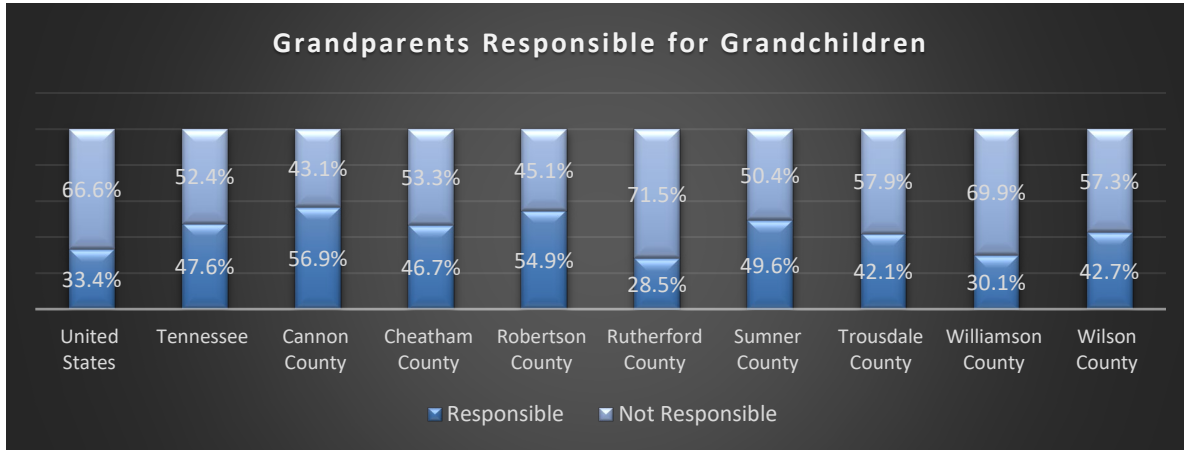
In Tennessee over 155,000 grandparents live with their grandchildren (under age 18), of which 47.6 percent are responsible for the care of their grandchildren (Table 7, Fig 12). In the MCCAA service area, more than 20,000 grandparents live with their grandchildren (under age 18), of which more than 8,000 are responsible for the care of their grandchildren, between 28.5 and 56.9 percent.

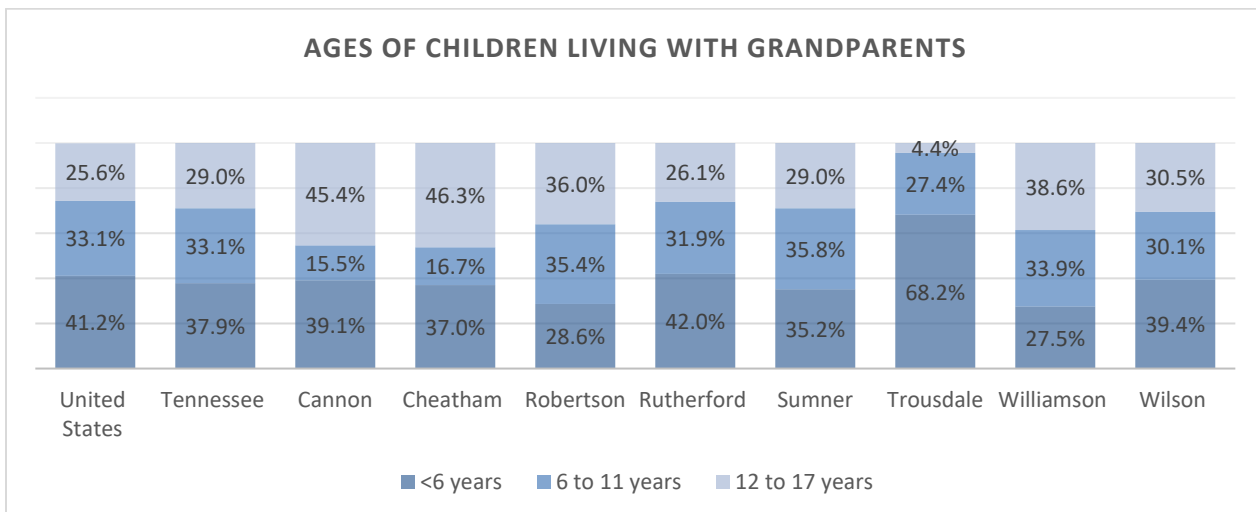


**Figure 10: Grandparents Living with and Responsible for Own Grandchildren (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)**

The number of grandchildren under the age of 18 living with a grandparent householder in Tennessee is 146,422 (9.5 percent of all children under age 18) (Table 8). Approximately 38 percent of those children are under the age of 6; 33 percent are between the ages of 6 and 11, and 29 percent are between 12 and 17 (Fig 13). In the MCCA service area combined, almost 18,000 grandchildren under the age of 18 live with a grandparent householder (between 3.1 and 16.4 percent of total children under age 18), and between 27.5 and 68.2 percent of these children are below age 6.

#### Socioeconomic Status

##### Education

###### *Educational Attainment (Adults)*

In the United States and Tennessee approximately 87.3 and 86.5 percent, respectively, of the adult population over age 25 is, at minimum, a high school graduate; in the MCCAA service area, between 79.8 and 95.5 percent of the adult population over age 25 has a high school degree or higher (Fig 14). The percentage of the adult population with a bachelor's degree in the United States and Tennessee is 30.9 and 26.1 percent, respectively. Within the MCCAA service area, between 12.2 and 58.1 percent of the adult population has a bachelor's degree or higher.

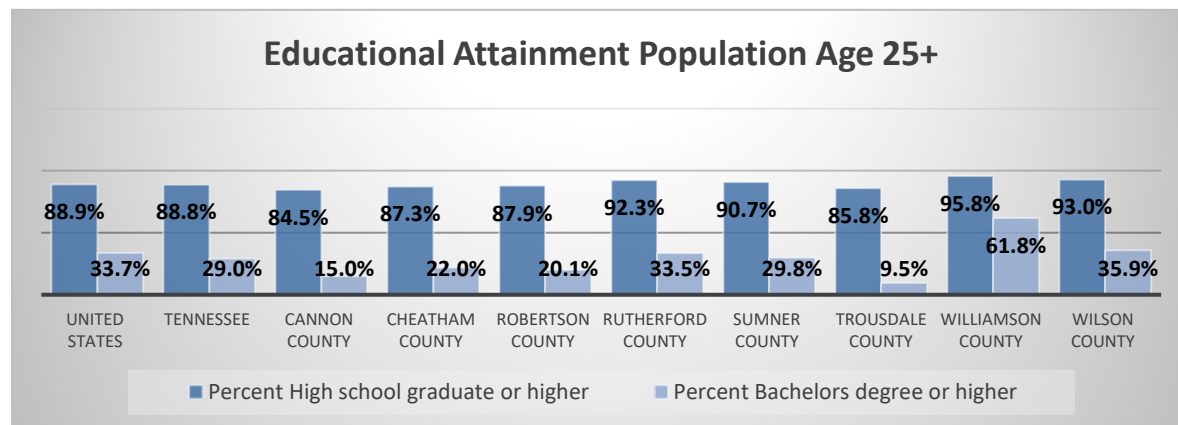


Figure 12: Educational Attainment Population Age 25+ (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)

As in the United States and Tennessee, in the majority of counties within the MCCAA service area, the proportion of women with a BA degree is higher than for their male counterparts, with the exception of Williamson Counties (Fig 15).

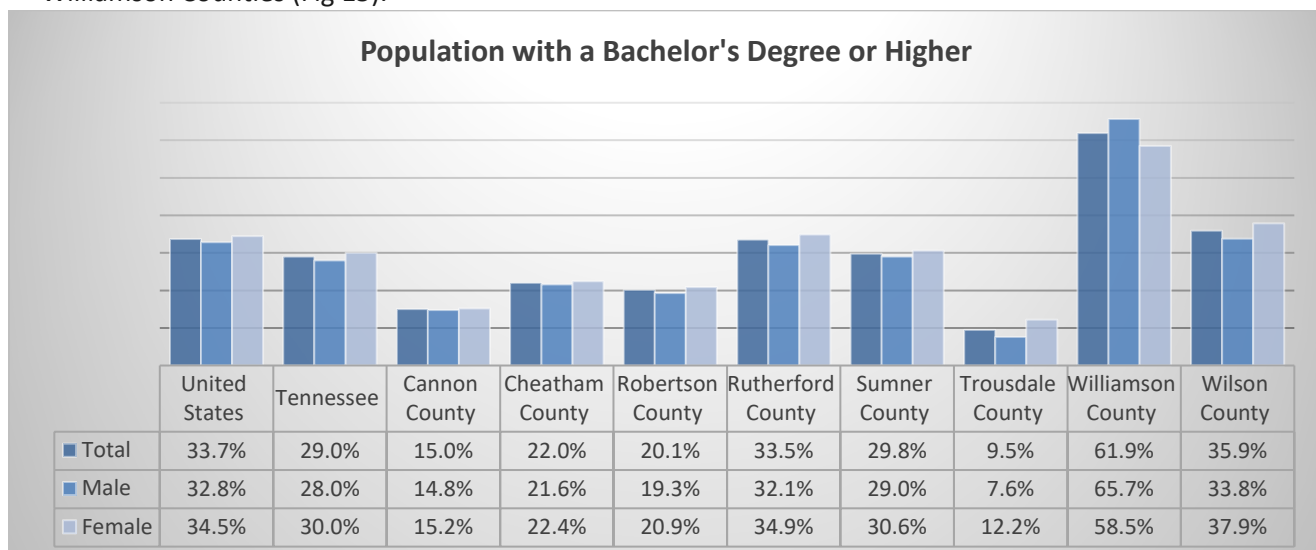


Figure 13: Educational Attainment Population Age 25+ Bachelor's Degree+ by Gender (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)

Based on a study conducted using data from the Early Childhood Longitudinal Study-Kindergarten Cohort, a parent's education (especially the mother's) has a tremendous impact on the child's future academic success. In the United States and Tennessee, 14.1 and 12.1 percent of women who

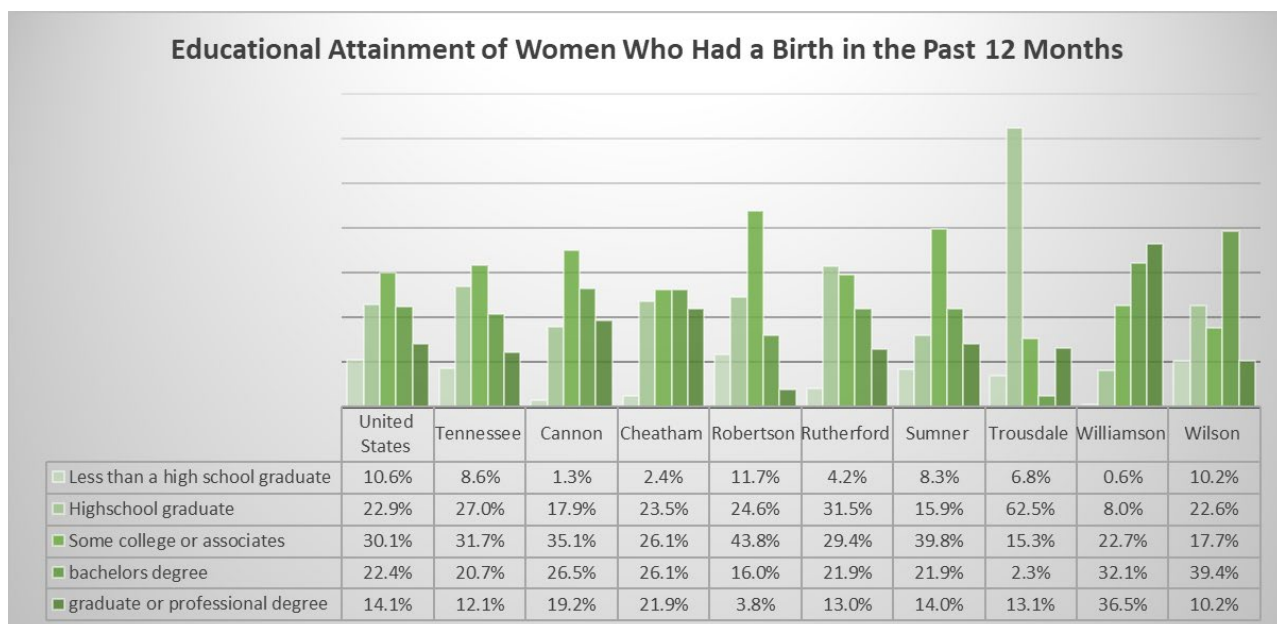
#### Mother's Education Significant to Children's Academic Success

A mother knows best—and the amount of education she attains can predict her children's success in reading and math. In fact, that success is greater if she had her child later in life, according to a new University of Michigan study.

Sandra Tang, a U-M psychology research fellow and the study's lead author, said children of mothers 19 and older usually enter kindergarten with higher levels of achievement. These kids continue to excel in math and reading at higher levels through eighth grade when compared to children of mothers 18 and younger.

had a birth in the past 12 months have a graduate or professional degree, respectively (Fig 16). Within the eight-county MCCA service area, Wilson and Williamson counties report the highest proportion of women who had a birth in the past 12 months who have a graduate or professional degree, 20.6 and 32.6 percent, respectively. In Trousdale County, no women who had a birth in the past 12 months reportedly have a graduate or professional degree.

Figure 17 illustrates the educational attainment of adults in more detail. The adult educational attainment of the population in Tennessee is similar to that of the population in the United States. The percentage of adults over the age of 25 with a graduate degree in the MCCA service area, when compared with the United States (13.1 percent) and Tennessee (10.8 percent), is lower in most counties, with the exception of Williamson County (21.4 percent).

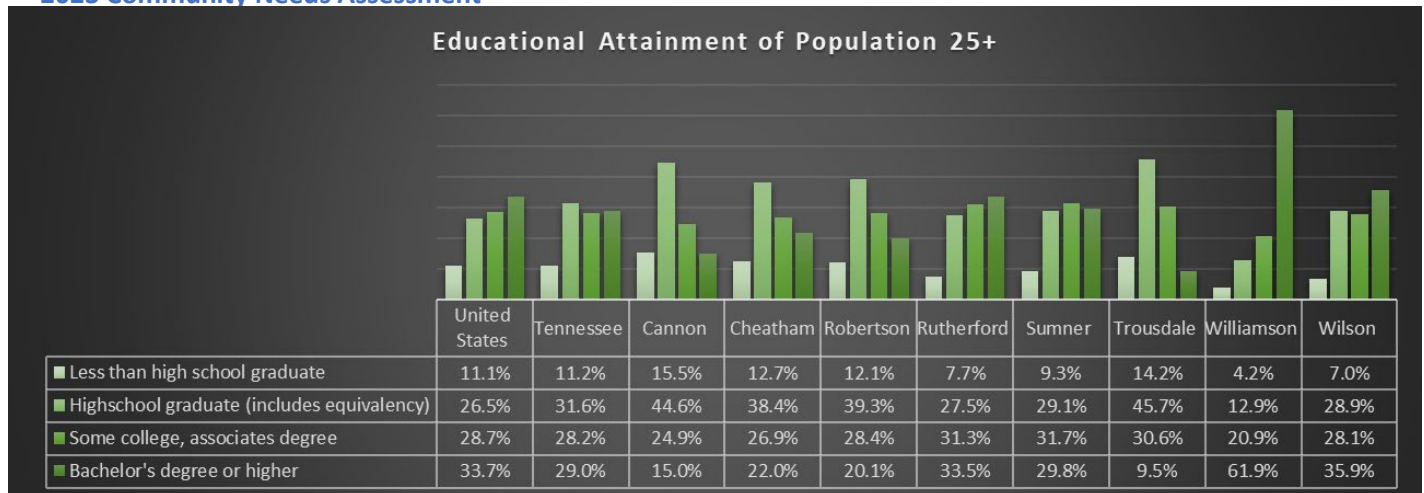


Figure 15: Educational Attainment of Population 25+ (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)

### Tennessee School System

Tennessee's reported total student membership in public schools during the 2017-18 program year reached more than 975,000 students, of which over 150,844 are in the MCCAA service area counties (Table 9). The majority of the students in the MCCAA service area are white; Rutherford County has the lowest proportion of white students (60.4 percent), and Cannon County has the highest proportion of white students (94.2 percent). Rutherford and Trousdale Counties have the highest proportion of black/African American students at 20.1 and 14.3 percent of total student membership. Robertson and Rutherford Counties have the highest proportion of Hispanic/Latino students, 15 and 14.2 percent, respectively.<sup>vi</sup>

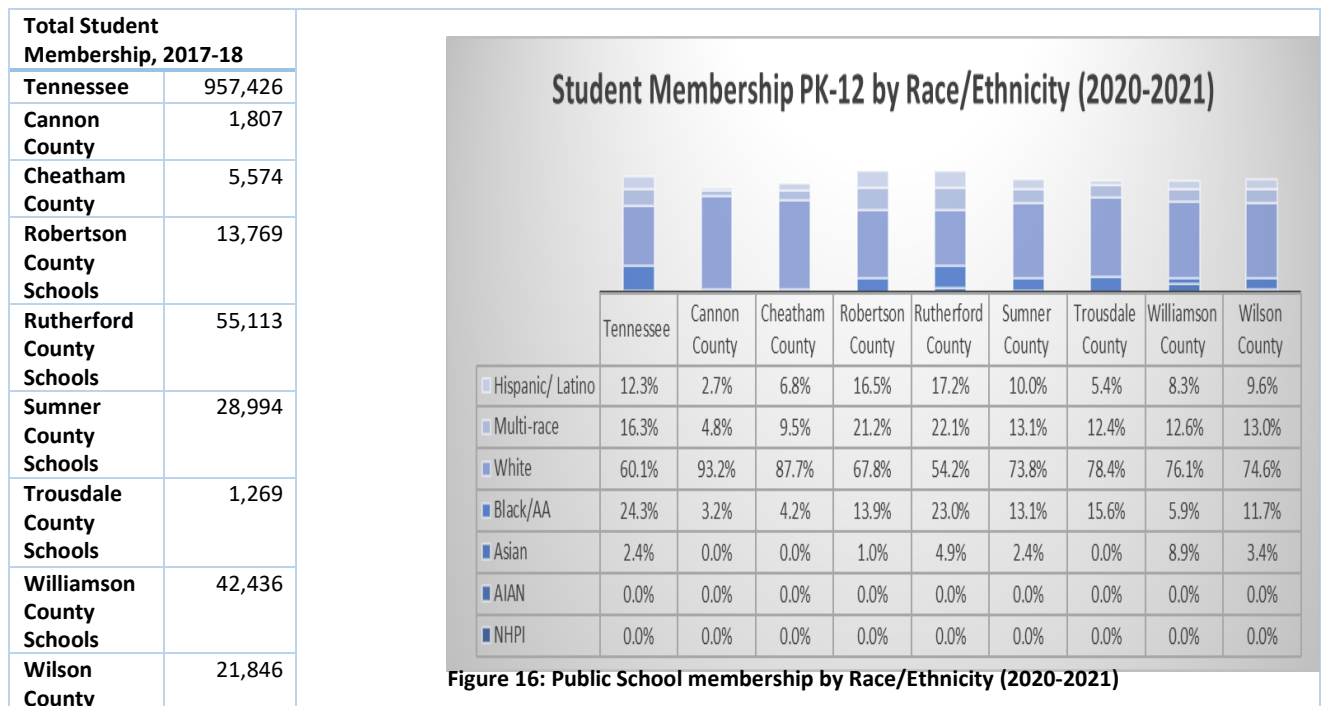


Figure 16: Public School membership by Race/Ethnicity (2020-2021)

#### Graduation Rates

At the end of the 2020-2021 school year in Tennessee, 89.9 percent of students entering as ninth graders graduated from high school within four years; the graduation rates for the same cohort in the MCCA service area county schools were between 87.2 and 98.8 (Fig 18).

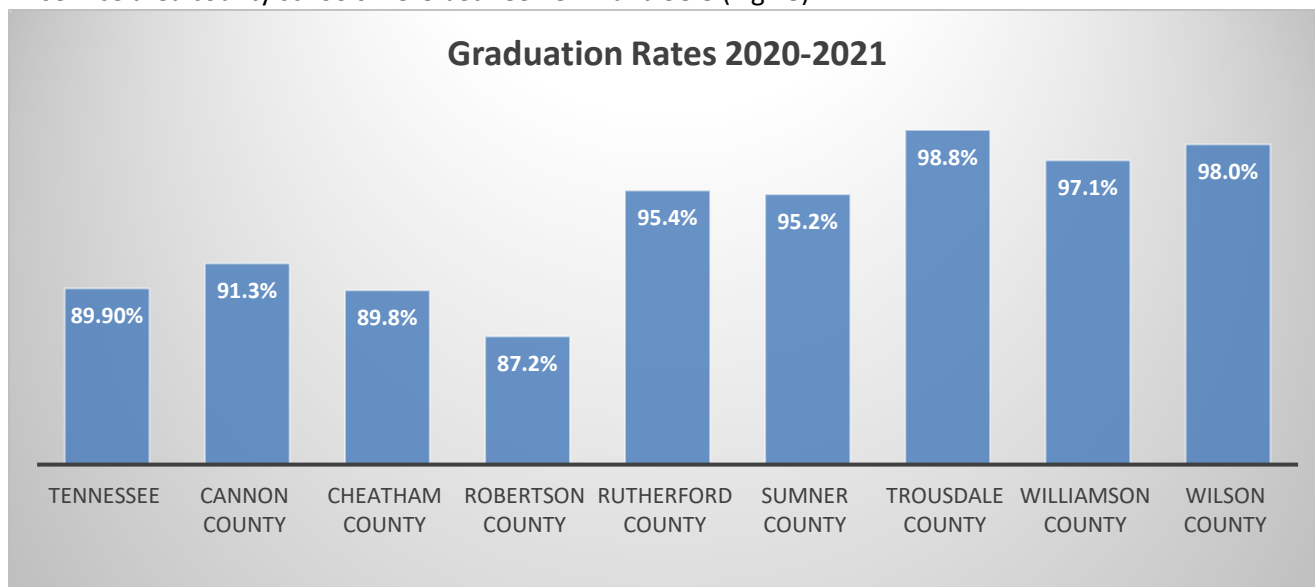


Figure 17: State and District Graduation Rates (2020-2021)

#### Employment Status and Income

##### Unemployment

Per the [U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics](#), the unemployment rate in Tennessee (not seasonally adjusted) in December 2022 was 2.9 percent. Williamson County, with an unemployment rate of 2.1 percent, has the lowest unemployment rate in the MCCA service area (Table 10).

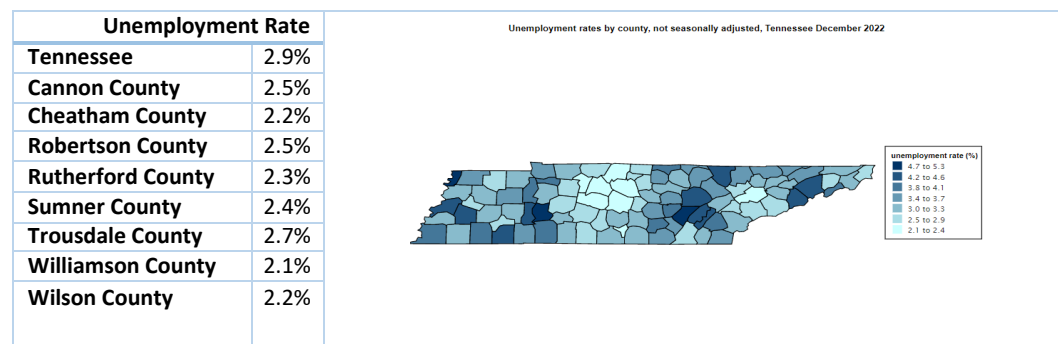
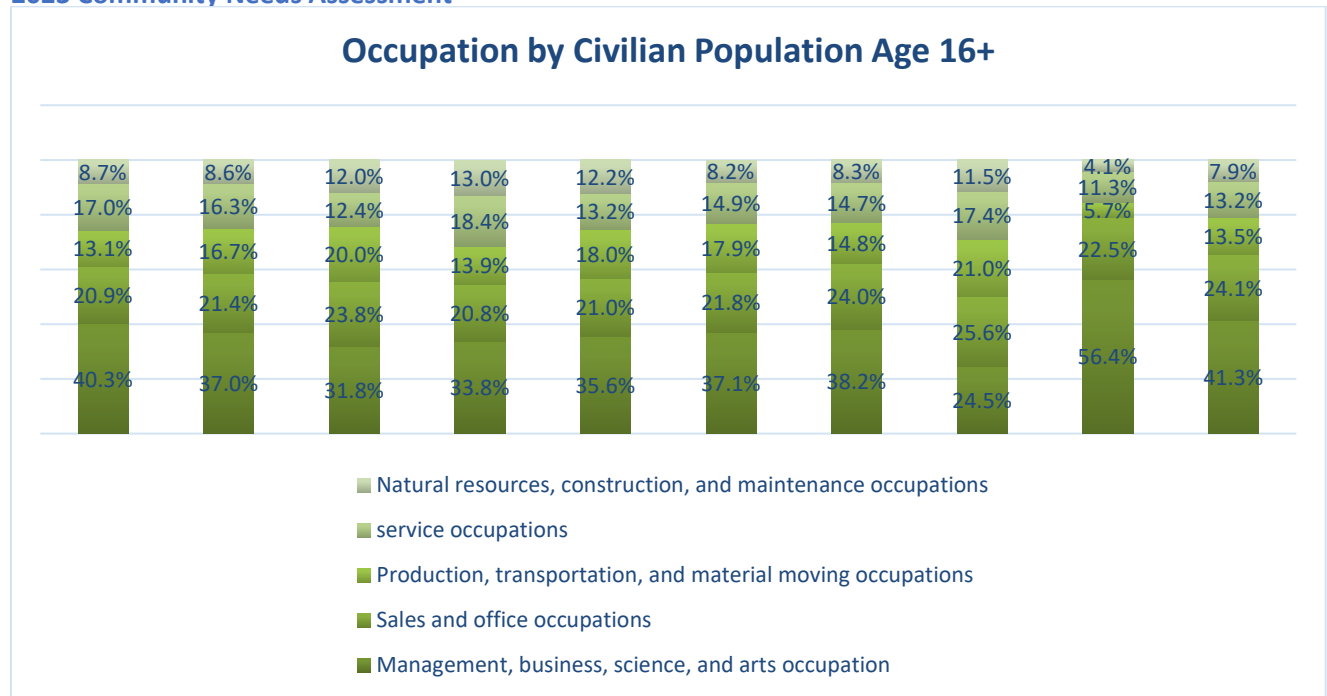


Table 8: Unemployment Rates by County, not seasonally adjusted, December 2022

##### Occupation

Like the United States, the largest percentage of the civilian employed population, age 16-plus, in Tennessee and the service area is employed in management, business, science and arts occupations; in Williamson County more than half of the population age 16 and over is employed in this sector. In Trousdale County, one-quarter of the civilian employed population, age 16-plus, is employed in management, business, science and arts occupation, one-fifth is employed in service occupations, and one-fourth is employed in sales and office occupations (Fig 19).

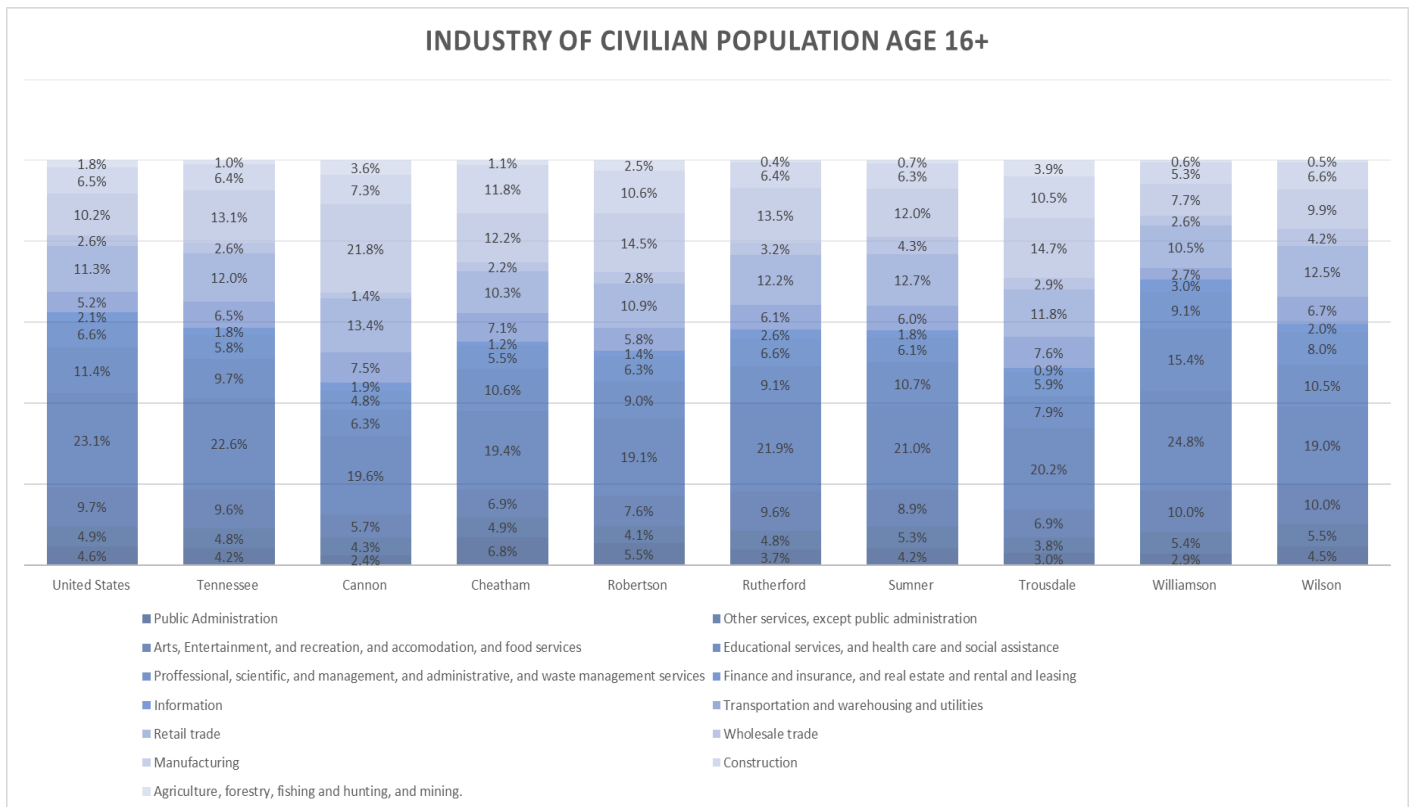
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**Figure 18 Occupation of Civilian Population Age 16+ (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)**

### Industry

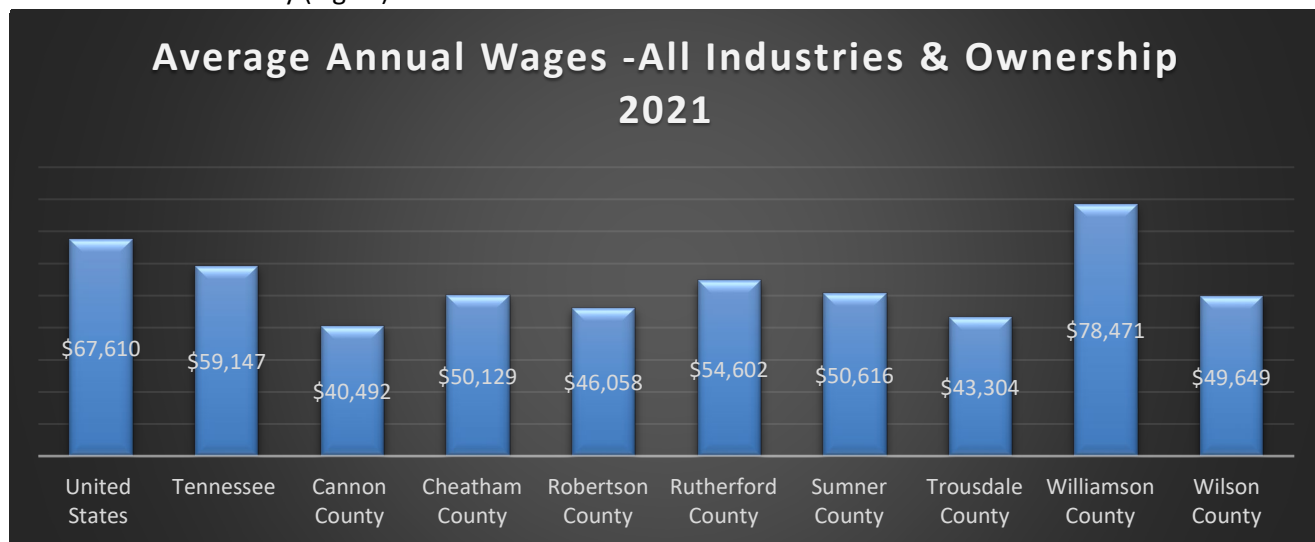
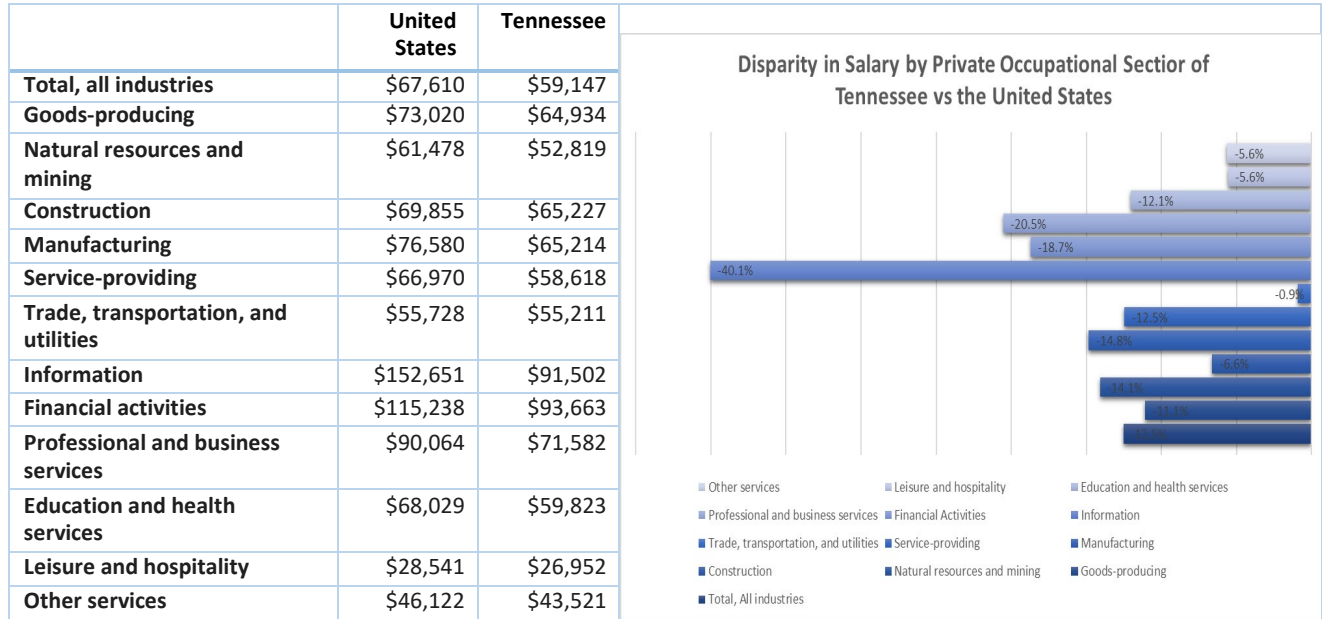


Figure 20: Average Annual Wages – All Industries and Ownerships (2021)

Figure 20 illustrates the industries in which the civilian employed population, age 16-plus, is employed. As in in the United States and Tennessee, within the MCCAA service area, a significant proportion of the population is employed in educational services, and health care and social assistance – between 19 and 24.8 percent, followed by manufacturing.

#### Median Household Income

Tennessee's median household income of \$54,833 is lower than that of the United States, which is \$64,994. With the exception of Cannon County (\$58,518), the median household income in the MCCAA service area is higher and ranges from \$56,981 (Trousdale County) to \$111,196 (Williamson County). The median family income in the United States is \$80,068 in Tennessee it is lower, \$68,792. The median family income in the MCCAA service area ranges from \$57,358 (Trousdale County) to \$127,613 (Williamson County) (Table 11).

Median and mean household incomes are included to ensure that comparisons are not misleading. Using the mean household income alone, for example, will ignore extreme values if the data is not symmetrically distributed. It is a fact that more people earn low salaries than high ones, because a fairly large proportion of the population works part-time, so the data will not be symmetrically distributed. Therefore, the mean is not the best "average" to use in this case when comparing income across the state.

The "mean" is the "average" (when one adds all of the values and then divides by the number of values).

The "median" is the "middle" value in a list of numbers (found after the list of numbers is sorted in order).

Per capita income measures the average income earned per person in a given area (city, region, country, etc.) in a specified year. It is calculated by dividing the area's total income by its total population.

#### Average Salary by Sector

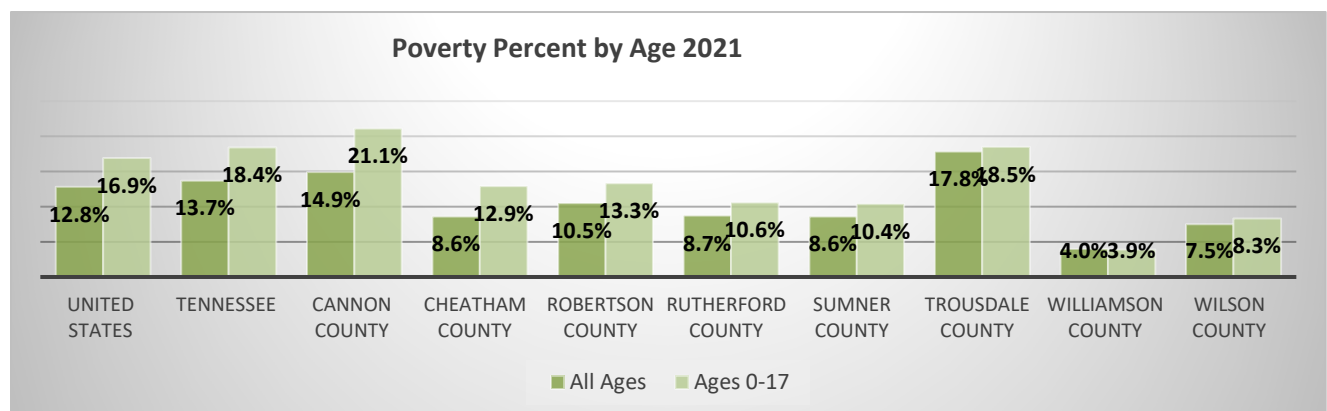


Figure 21: Poverty (2020 SAIPE)

According to the [U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics](#), the total average salary of all sectors combined in the United States is \$67,610, compared with \$59,147 in Tennessee. The average annual wage of all industries is lower in all counties within the MCCAA service area when compared with the state, with the exception of Williamson County (Fig 21).

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics provides average annual wages by occupational sector for private ownership establishments (all non-local, state or federal government entities). Based on this data, the average annual wages for all private industries in Tennessee is \$59,147. This is 14.31 percent lower than the United States average, which is \$67,610 (Table 12). This discrepancy can be observed across all sectors; with a range from -5.6 percent to -40.1 percent

Tables 13 provides the average annual wages by all private occupational sectors in the United States, Tennessee and the MCCA service area. Wages for the majority of industries in all counties within the MCCA service area are lower than the United States and Tennessee, except in Williamson County, where wages for all sectors except natural resources and mining and other services are higher than the state average.

#### Living Wage

Dr. Amy K. Glasmeier from MIT developed the [Living Wage Calculator](#) to determine an individual's ability to live within a certain standard of living. Based on the Living Wage Calculator methodology, which considers real cost expenses, income and payroll taxes to determine the minimum employment earnings necessary to meet basic family needs to maintain self-sufficiency, families earning minimum wage in the service area are not able to survive without a safety net and government assistance.

In the MCCA service area the hourly living wage for a single parent with two children is \$41.68; the hourly living wage for a two-parent household (where one adult is working with two children is \$37.76. The federal poverty wage amount for those two types of family compositions is \$11.07 per hour. The minimum wage in Tennessee is \$7.25/hour. Table 14 provides information on annual expenses by state and county for needs including food, child care, medical, housing, and transportation. In the MCCA service area, the required annual income of a single-parent family with two children, before taxes is now \$81,925; the required annual income of a two-parent family (with one parent working) with two children is \$78,538. The Federal Poverty Level for a family of three is \$23,030 and the Federal Poverty Level for a family of four is \$27,750.

The living wage for a single parent family with two children in Tennessee is **2.5 times the federal poverty level** for a family of three, which is \$21,330!

Compared with the state's average, the living wage for a single-parent family with two children is higher for all counties within the MCCA service area; the same disparity applies for a two-parent family (one adult working) and two children (Table 14).

The living wage model is an alternative measure of basic needs. It is a market-based approach that draws upon geographically specific expenditure data related to a family's likely minimum food, childcare, health insurance, housing, transportation, and other basic necessities (e.g. clothing, personal care items, etc.) costs. The living wage draws on these cost elements and the rough effects of income and payroll taxes to determine the minimum employment earnings necessary to meet a family's basic needs while also maintaining self-sufficiency.

The living wage model is a 'step up' from poverty as measured by the poverty thresholds, but it is a small 'step up', one that accounts for only the basic needs of a family. The living wage model does not allow for what many consider the basic necessities enjoyed by many Americans. It does not budget funds for pre-prepared meals or those eaten in restaurants. It does not include money for entertainment, nor does it does not allocate leisure time for unpaid vacations or holidays. Lastly, it does not provide a financial means for planning for the future through savings and investment or for the purchase of capital assets (e.g. provisions for retirement or home purchases). The living wage is the minimum income standard that, if met, draws a very fine line between the financial independence of the working poor and the need to seek out public assistance or suffer consistent and severe housing and food insecurity. In light of this fact, the living wage is perhaps better defined as a minimum subsistence wage for persons living in the United States. - <http://livingwage.mit.edu/>

#### Poverty

The [U.S. Department of Health and Human Services](#) issues the Federal Poverty Guidelines in the [Federal Register](#) annually. The Poverty Guidelines for a family of four in 2022 is \$27,750. Research suggests that a family of four requires at least double that amount to make ends meet. The measurement only accounts for the family's annual gross income; it does not include other aspects of economic status such as housing, debt, assets, or property. The calculation used today was originally developed in the 1960s based on the amount of money spent by families on food. The poverty level was reached by multiplying that dollar amount (money spent by families on food) times three. Today, families not only spend approximately one-seventh of their annual income on food, but the cost of childcare, transportation, housing, and health care have increased dramatically.

**Poverty in Tennessee.** Per the 2020 [Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates \(SAIPE\)](#), 13.7 percent of the population in Tennessee lives in poverty (more than 930,000 individuals), and 18.4 percent of children, ages 0-17, live in poverty (more than 375,000 children) (Table 15, Fig 23). More than 75,000 Head-Start-and Early-Head-Start-eligible children, ages 0 to 4, live in poverty in Tennessee. In the MCCAA service area, the poverty rate for the population overall ranges from 4.0 (Williamson County) to 17.8 percent (Trousdale County); the poverty rate for children, ages 0-17, ranges from 3.9 (Williamson County) to 21.1 percent (Cannon County).

#### Poverty by Race/Ethnicity

Although the overall poverty rate (for all ages) in Tennessee is 12.8 percent, the poverty rate for blacks/African Americans (who make up 16.5 percent of the population in the state) is 23.6 percent. The poverty rate for Hispanic/Latino residents in the state (who make up 5.8 percent of the population in the state) is 23.2 percent (Fig 24). A significant disparity is seen in the poverty rates between the races and ethnicities in each of the MCCAA service area counties. **Note:** Poverty rates for those identifying as American Indian Alaskan Native (AIAN) and Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (NHPI) were not included due to the small population size in the state and each service area county.

### Percent of Population in Poverty by Race/Ethnicity

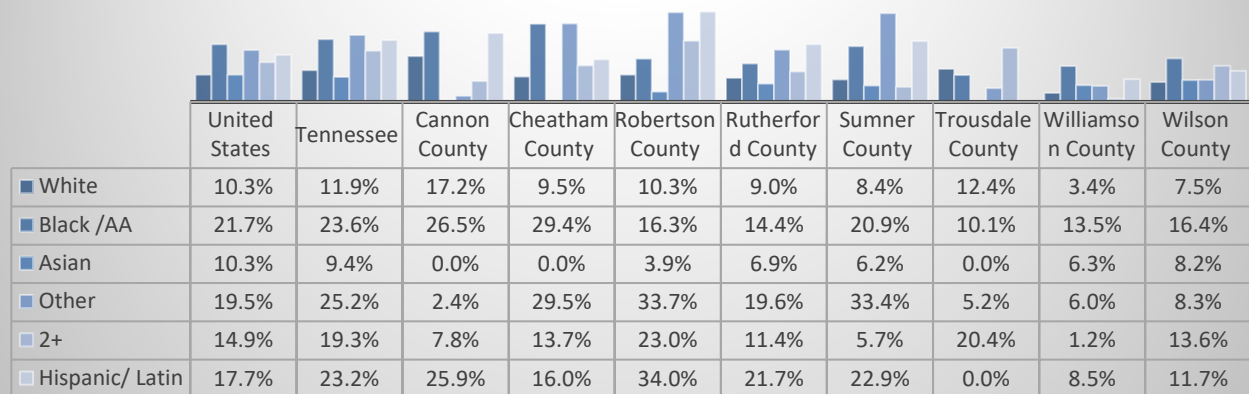


Figure 22: Poverty (2021 ACS 5-year Estimate)

#### Poverty by Educational Attainment

Obtaining a higher level of education significantly impacts poverty rate; in Tennessee 13.5 percent of the population with only a high school degree lives in poverty, while 4.3 percent of the population with a bachelor's degree or higher lives in poverty. Figure 25 illustrates the poverty rates for adults, ages 25 and over, based on their educational attainment.

### Percent of Population in Poverty by Educational Attainment

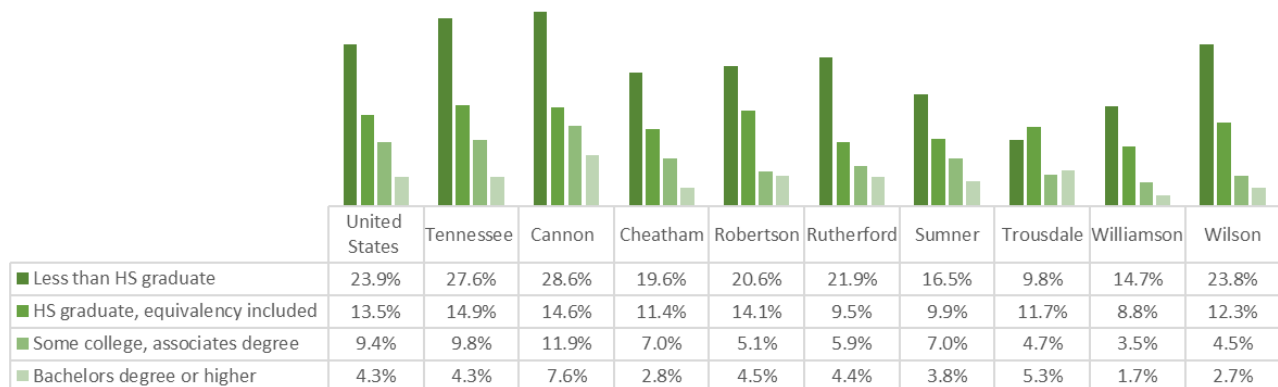


Figure 23: Poverty by Educational Attainment (20 ACS 5-Year Estimates)

#### Poverty by Employment Status

Like educational attainment, a significant difference is seen in poverty rates between employed and unemployed individuals. Females, employed or unemployed, live in poverty at higher rates than their employed or unemployed male counterparts in most geographic areas studied, except in Robertson and Trousdale Counties, where employed males live in poverty at higher rates than employed females (Fig 26).

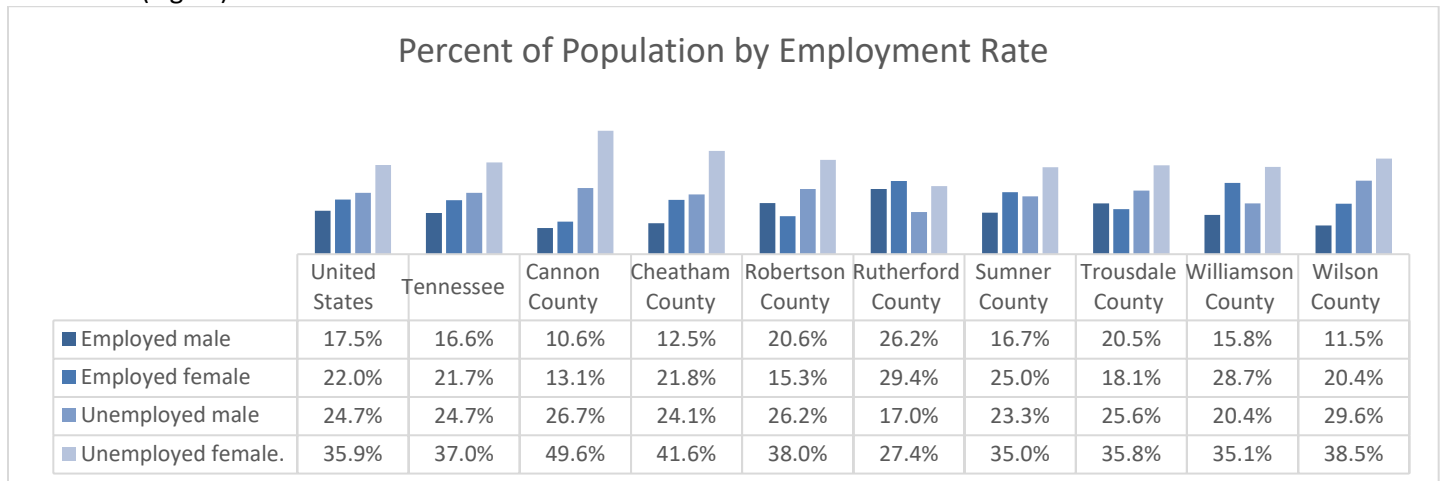


Figure 24: Population in Poverty by Employment Rates (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)

#### Births to Women in Poverty

Of the nearly 4 million women between the ages 15 and 50 who had a birth in the United States in the past 12 months, nearly 1 million are living in poverty. In Tennessee more than 20,000 women gave birth in poverty, of which 2,700 were in the MCCAA service area. Trousdale County, at 50.6 percent, reports the highest percentage of women who gave birth in poverty; Cannon County had the lowest, at 8.1 percent (Table 16).

#### Families in Poverty

In the United States 8.9 percent of all families live in poverty, and 24.5 percent of families led by a single female (no husband present) live in poverty. Poverty rates for families with related children under the age of 18 are significantly higher. For example, in the United States, married couple families without children under age 18 live in poverty at a rate of 3.4 percent, while families with five or more children under age 18 live in poverty at a rate of 36.5 percent. Almost three of four families led by a single female, with five or more children under age 18, live in poverty, 82.5 percent (Table 17).

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In Tennessee families without children under age 18 live in poverty at a rate of 3.7 percent, while almost 40 percent of families with five or more children under age 18 live in poverty, 51.4 percent. Like the United States, more than four out of five families in the state led by a single female, with five or more children under age 18, live in poverty, 80.1 percent. Table 17 provides family poverty data for each of the MCCAA service area counties.

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#### Children in Poverty

According to the 2020 Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE) from the U.S. Census Bureau, Tennessee is home to approximately 75,501 children, ages 0-4, in poverty; SAIPE estimates for children in poverty, ages 0-4, are not provided for individual counties, townships, or census tracts. To estimate children in poverty in the MCCAA service area, poverty data from the 2021 ACS 5-year Estimates (B17001) are used. These estimates use data from 2016 to 2021 and reflect a 17 percent greater number of children in poverty: 88,155 vs. 75,501. Table 18 provides information on children, ages 0 to 4, living in poverty for the United States, Tennessee, and the MCCAA service area by race and ethnicity.

As previously stated, 16.5 percent of Tennessee's population is black/African American, yet 34.3 percent of children, ages 0-4, in poverty are black/African American. Similarly, although only 3.8 percent of the state's population is multi-racial, 9.3 percent of children in poverty identify as having two or more races (Fig 27).

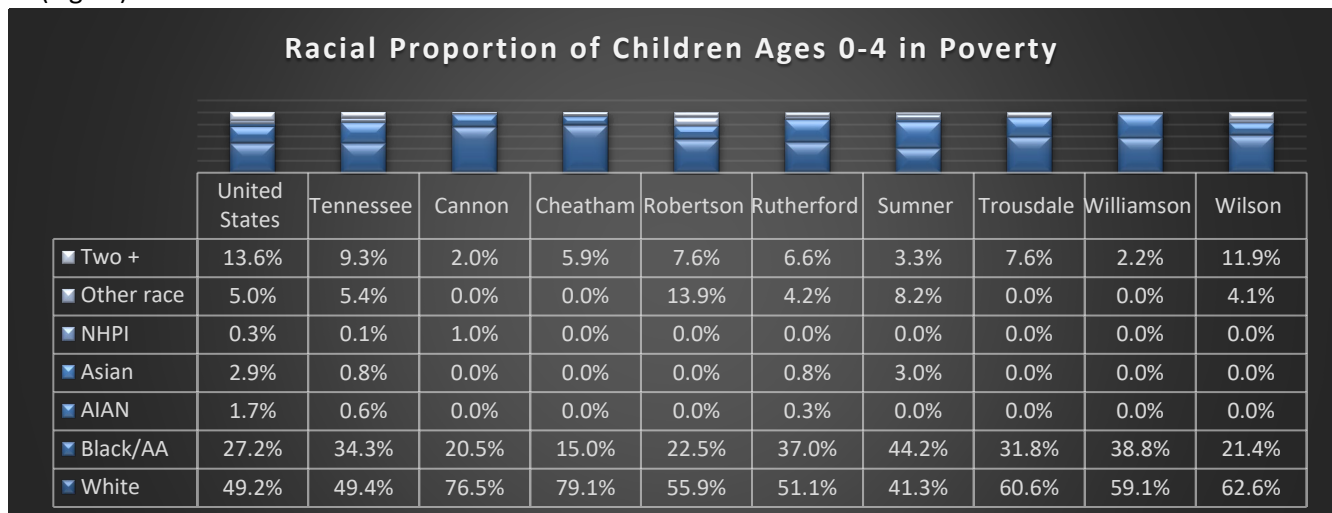


Figure 25: Racial Proportion of Children Ages 0-4 in Poverty (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)

The discrepancy between the general population and the proportion of children, ages 0-4, in poverty is also seen for Hispanic/Latino residents in Tennessee; although only 5.8 percent of the population in the state is Hispanic/Latino, 17.3 percent of children, ages 0-4, in poverty are Hispanic/Latino. In Robertson County more than one-third, 39.9 percent, of children, ages 0-4, in poverty are Hispanic/Latino (Fig 28).

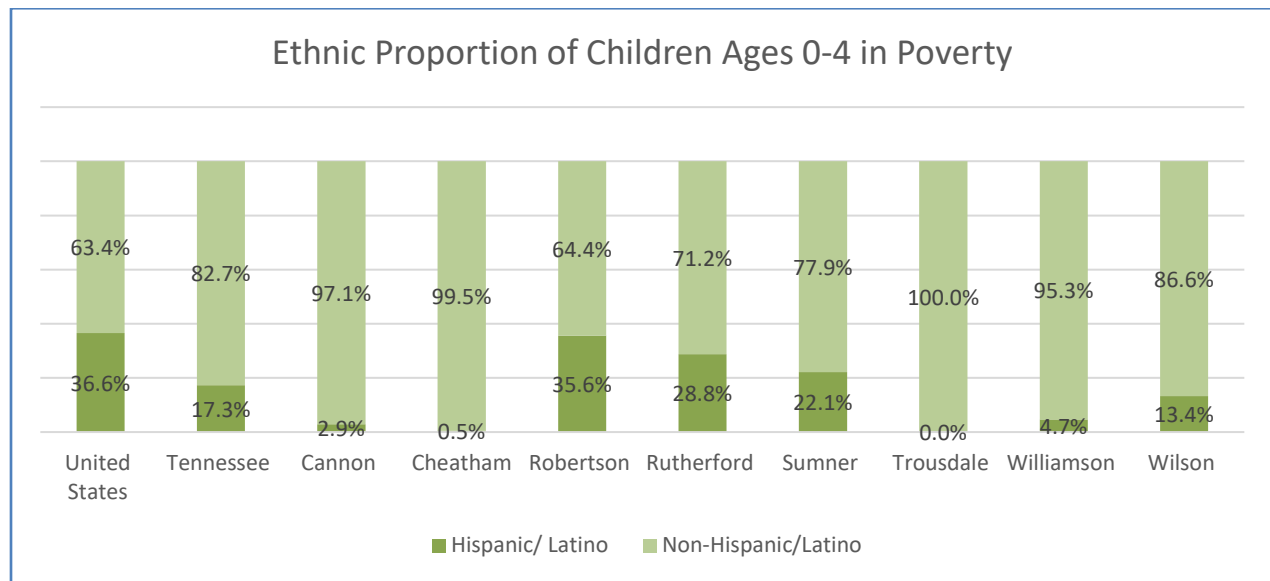


Figure 26: Ethnic Proportion of Children Ages 0-4 in Poverty (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)

## Federal Assistance Benefits

### *Temporary Assistance to Needy Families*

Based on data from [KIDS COUNT Data Center](#) there were a total of 25,428 children in 2021 in Tennessee who received Families First assistance. Within the MCCAA service area, Rutherford County reported the highest number of children receiving Families First grants, 590. Table 19 provides the number of children who received Families First assistance for each of the service area counties.

[Temporary Assistance for Needy Families \(TANF\)](#) provides temporary cash assistance and employment-related services to enable families with children to become self-supporting. Tennessee provides TANF through a program called Families First. The program's benefits are time-limited to 60 months in a participant's lifetime. To be eligible for the program, participants must agree to follow a Personal Responsibility Plan (PRP). As part of the PRP, the participant agrees to keep immunizations and health checks up-to-date for their children, keep their children in school, co-operate with Child Support Services to establish paternity, and participate in a work/training program for at least 30 hours per week.

The Center on Budget and Policy Priorities indicates that the ratio of TANF recipients continues to decline. In 2020, the ration in TN was 21:100, meaning that only 21 of every 100 families that could benefit from TANF/ Families First dollars are actually receiving the benefit.

### *Supplemental Security Income*

[Supplemental Security Income, or SSI](#), provides monthly financial payments to low-income adults that are blind, disabled, or age 65 and older. Disabled or blind children are also eligible to receive SSI benefits. Families receiving SSI are categorically eligible for certain agency services, providing the family an additional benefit and supportive resource. In Tennessee more than 179,000 children under the age of 18 received SSI benefits in 2017, of which 11,251 were in the Mid-Cumberland service area (Table 20).

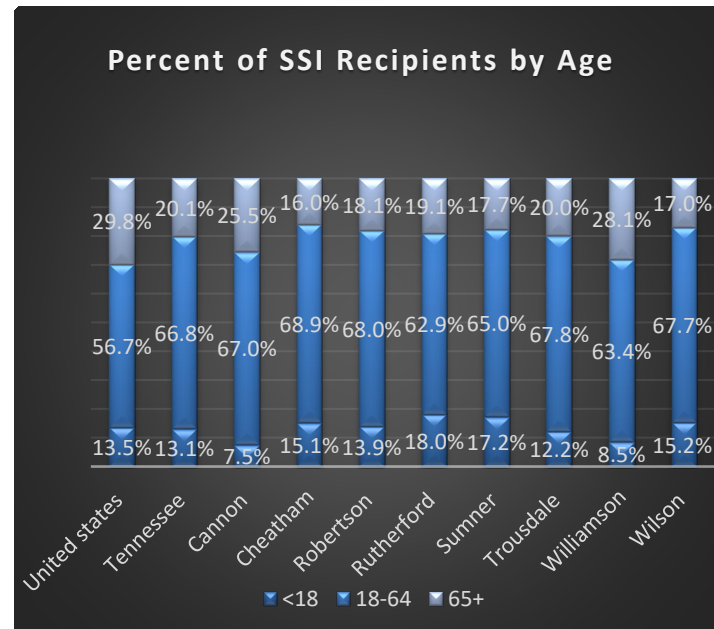


Figure 27: SSI Recipients by Age (Kids Count 2021)

## Cultural and Linguistic Characteristics

### Religion

Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, and other Southern states are among the most highly religious states in the nation, while New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Vermont and Maine in New England are among the least devout, according to some of the key measures used to determine levels of religiosity in the Pew Research Center's most recent Religious Landscape Study (Fig 29).

% of adults who are "highly religious"

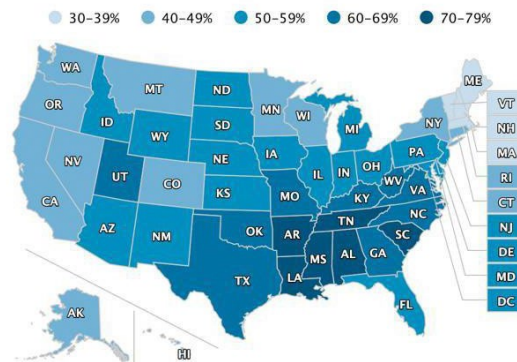


Figure 28: Overall Religiosity by State

Worship attendance, prayer frequency, belief in God and the self-described importance of religion in one's life were the four measures of religious observance used by Pew to determine the rankings. Seventy-eight percent of Tennesseans say they believe in God with absolute certainty and 70 percent say they pray daily;

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[Tennessee](#) is the 2<sup>nd</sup> most religious state in the nation. Regarding the [religious denominations](#) in Tennessee, the overwhelming majority are Christians (81 percent).

According to the study, the U.S. public is becoming less religious in modest overall rates of belief and practice, but religiously affiliated Americans are as observant as in years past. There is a great deal of stability in the U.S. religious landscape. The recent decrease in religious beliefs and behaviors is attributable to the growing minority of Americans, particularly in the Millennial generation, who say they do not belong to any organized faith. Among the three-quarters of U.S. adults who claim a religion, there has been no discernible drop in most measures of religious commitment. Indeed, by some conventional measures, religiously affiliated Americans are more devout than they were a few years ago.

### Language

In the United States more than one in four people between the ages of 5 and 17, and one in five people, age 18-plus, [living in poverty](#), speak Spanish as their primary language (24.5 and 17.4 percent, respectively). In the state of Tennessee, a smaller proportion of the population in poverty speaks Spanish, 11.6 percent of those ages 5 to 17, and 5.5 percent of those ages 18 and older. In the MCCAA service area Rutherford County has the highest proportion of the population in poverty that speaks Spanish, 25.3 percent of those ages 5 to 17, and Robertson County is the highest in Spanish only speakers of those ages 18 and older with 15 percent (Table 28).

## Housing and Homelessness

### Fair Market Rent

According to the [National Low-Income Housing Coalition](#) (NLIHC), in 2020 33 percent of Tennessee's households were renters; the Fair Market Rent (FMR) for a two-bedroom home in Tennessee is \$952/month. To be able to rent a two-bedroom home, without exceeding 30 percent of one's income, a renter must earn \$38,060 annually; yet the median income for a renter in Tennessee is \$39,794. With a median income of \$39,794 a renter is able to afford \$995 for a home, only \$43 dollars less than the fair market rental value of a two-bedroom home.

In Tennessee, one must earn \$38,060 per year to afford the Fair Market Rent for a two-bedroom home. This is \$5,590 more than the poverty guidelines for a family of five, which is \$32,470!

*This means that if you earn enough to place your family of five in a two-bedroom home, you are OVER-INCOME and may not be eligible for HS/EHS services.*

It is critical to point out that families eligible for Community Action programs do not earn wages typical of an average renter in the state. The NLIHC considers those who earn 30 percent of the annual median income (AMI) to have "extremely low income." For Tennessee this amount is \$20,637, which is \$2,327 more than the Poverty Guidelines level for a family of two (which is \$18,310). The rent that someone with "extremely low income" can afford is only \$377 per month, \$575 less than the fair market rent for a two-bedroom home (Table 30).



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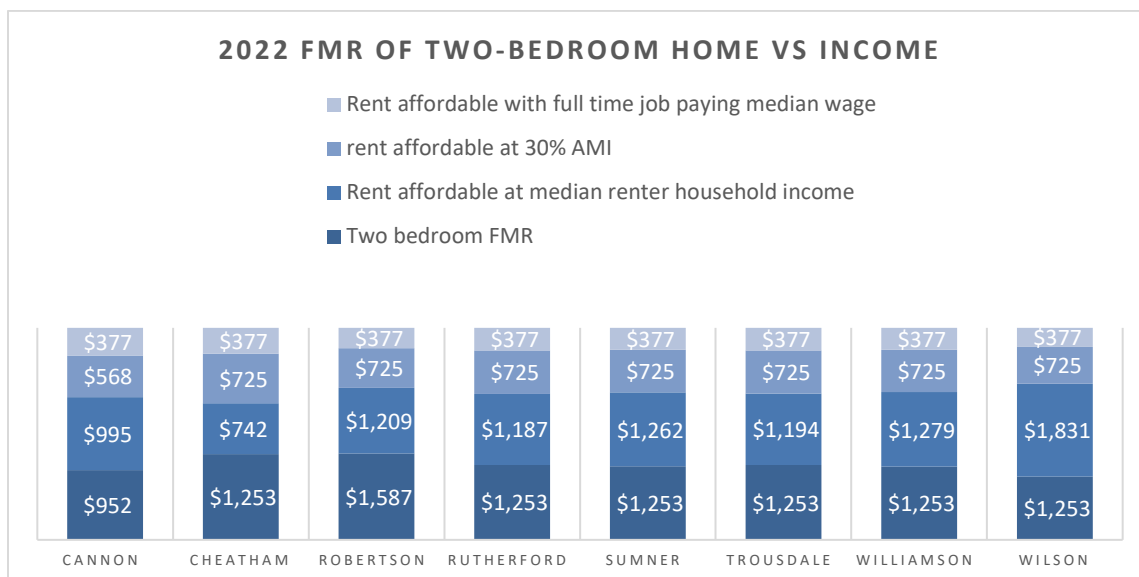

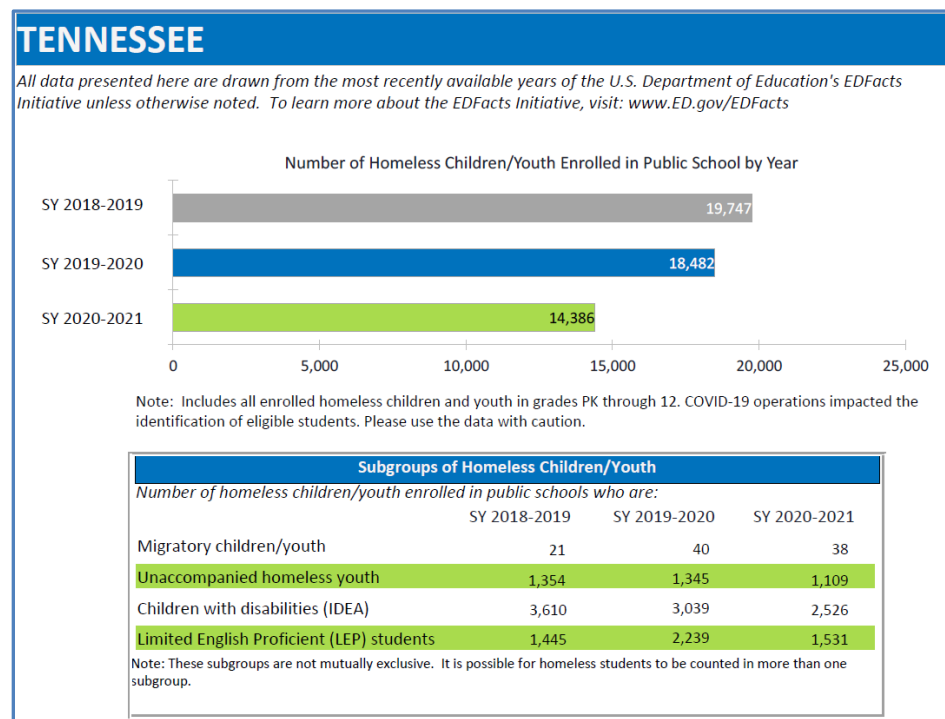
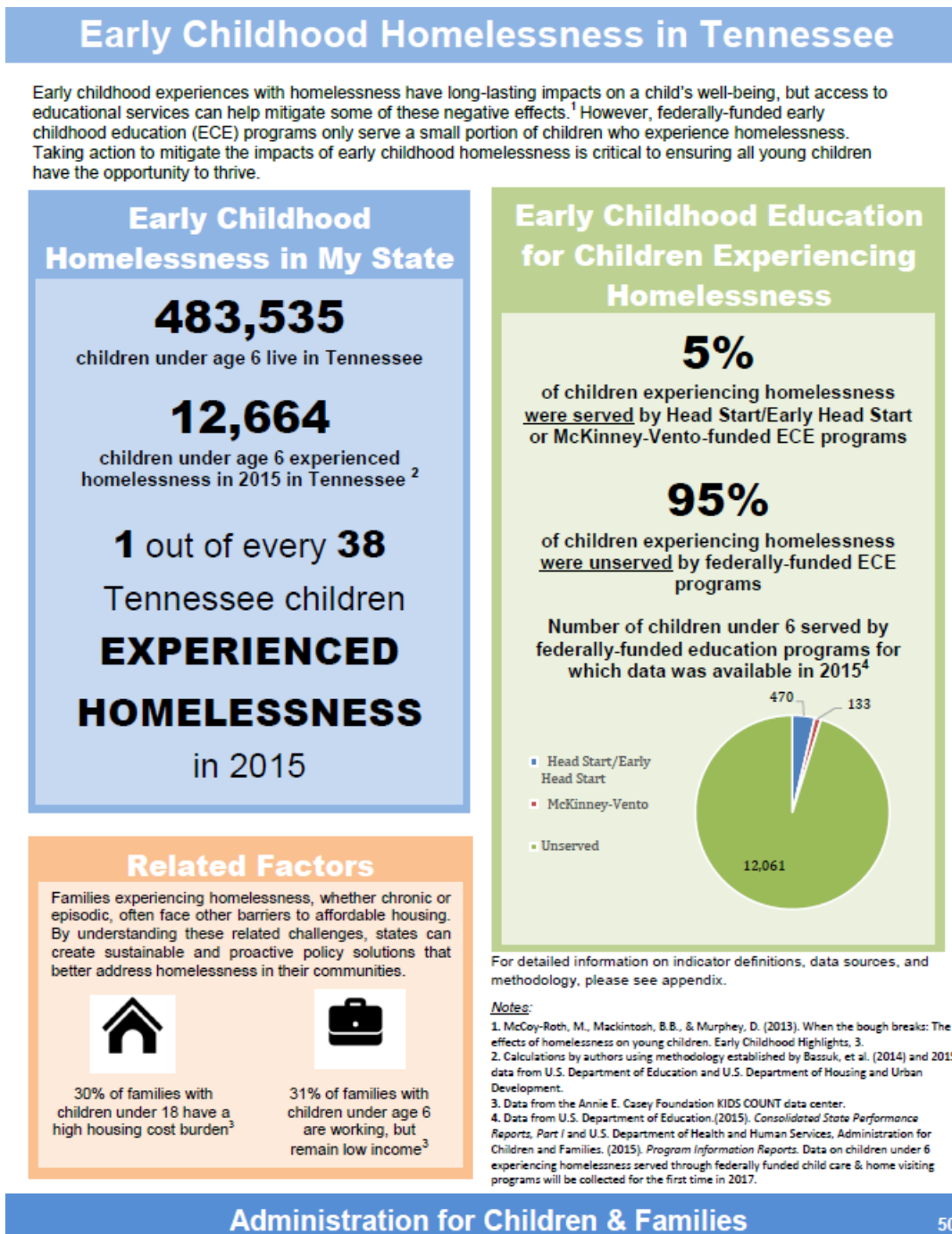


Figure 32: Homeless Students- TN Homeless Education Program (2020-2021)

In the MCCA service area, between 21 and 35 percent of total households are renters. Rent affordable at median household income ranges from \$742 (Cannon County) to \$1,831 (Williamson County). Rent affordable by a household classified as “extremely low income” is \$586 per month and the fair market rental value of a two-bedroom home is \$975. For those working a full-time job, earning minimum wage, affordable rent is not more than \$377 (Fig 32).

Housing expenditures that exceed 30 percent of household income have historically been viewed as an indicator of a housing affordability problem. The conventional 30 percent of household income that a household can devote to housing costs before the household is said to be “burdened” evolved from the United States National Housing Act of 1937. The 30-percent rule was considered a rule of thumb for the amount of income that a family could spend and still have enough left over for other non-discretionary spending; it made its way to owner-occupied housing too.

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The high cost of home ownership and rental units continues to make it difficult for low-income families to access affordable housing. In the MCCA service area those earning minimum wage (\$7.25/hour) must work 133 hours per week to afford a two-bedroom home at fair market rental value.

#### Public Housing

Based on data gathered from the [Office of Public Policy Development and Research \(PD&R\), under the Department of Housing and Urban Development \(HUD\)](#), in 2021 there were a total of 105,863 housing units available in Tennessee within all HUD Programs. Of those housing units, 90 percent were occupied by 195,803 residents, with an average family expenditure of \$288 per month and an average HUD expenditure of \$611 per month. The average household income of those living in public housing programs in Tennessee is \$12,310. Approximately four out of 10 households (37 percent) had a female head of household with children, 55 percent of residents are minorities, 53 percent are black/African American, and 2 percent are Hispanic/Latino (Table 31).

In the combined MCCA service area, there were 6,283 units available, with an occupancy rate of 74 to 98 percent (Williamson and Cannon Counties, respectively). More than 12,000 residents live in public housing, with an average family expenditure of \$276 to \$389 in rent. The household income for public housing residents in the service area ranges from \$11,968 to \$15,903. Between 20 and 84 percent of residents are female heads of household with children, and approximately 5 to 57 percent of residents are minorities (Table 31).

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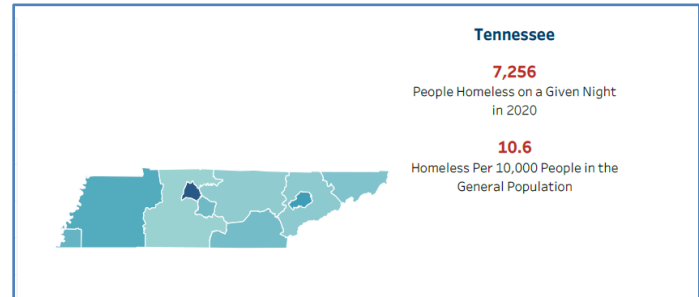
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#### Homelessness

##### Point-In-Time

Overall, the number of homeless individuals in the nation has decreased from 647,258 in 2007 to 580,466 in 2020. This is primarily due to concentrated efforts to house particular groups such as Veterans and families. Homeless individuals continue to be the most underserved demographic.

In Tennessee, the December 2022 Point-In-Time count of the homeless population was 10,567, an increase of 3,100 individuals from the 2019 count of 7,467, reflecting a 41.5 percent increase. The significant increase can be attributed to the COVID 19 pandemic and the extreme cost of housing in Tennessee.

In 2015 HUD added a new reporting category for parenting youth: someone who is under age 25 identifying as the parent or legal guardian of one or more children, present with or sleeping in the same place as that youth parent, and who is not in the company of someone over age 24.<sup>xxii</sup> In December 2022, 50 homeless, parenting youth were counted in the state of Tennessee (Table 32).

The [Point-in-Time \(PIT\)](#) count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons on a [single night in January](#). HUD requires that [Continuums of Care](#) conduct an annual count of homeless persons who are sheltered in emergency shelter, transitional housing, and Safe Havens on a single night. Continuums of Care also must conduct a count of unsheltered homeless persons every other year (odd-numbered years). Each count is planned, coordinated, and carried out locally. The Housing Inventory Count (HIC) is a point-in-time inventory of provider programs within a Continuum of Care that provide beds and units dedicated to serve persons who are homeless, categorized by five Program Types: Emergency Shelter; Transitional Housing; Rapid Re-housing; Safe Haven; and Permanent Supportive Housing.

##### McKinney-Vento

McKinney-Vento is the primary piece of federal legislation dealing with the education of children and youth experiencing homelessness in U.S. public schools. It was reauthorized as Title X, Part C, of the No Child Left Behind Act in January 2002.

The McKinney-Vento program is designed to address the problems that homeless children and youth have faced in enrolling, attending, and succeeding in school. Under this program, State Educational Agencies (SEAs) must ensure that each homeless child and youth has equal access to the same free, appropriate public education, including a public preschool education, as other children and youth. In addition, homeless students may not be separated from the mainstream school environment.

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The McKinney-Vento Act defines “homeless children and youth” as individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence. The term includes –

Children and youth who are:

- sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason (sometimes referred to as *doubled-up*);
- living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to lack of alternative adequate accommodations;
- living in emergency or transitional shelters;
- abandoned in hospitals; or
- awaiting foster care placement;

Children and youth who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings;

Children and youth who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings; and

Migratory children who qualify as homeless because they are living in circumstances described above.

The HUD definition of homelessness is narrower than those used by the Departments of Education (ED), Health and Human Services (HHS), Labor, Justice, and Agriculture. HUD focuses primarily on homeless people on the streets, in shelters, in vehicles, or in other places not meant for human habitation. The PIT count offers an important snapshot of homelessness on a given night at one point in the year, with a particular focus on individuals. However, it does not adequately estimate the number of individuals and family members who experience homelessness through the course of a year— especially children. <http://www.homelesschildrenamerica.org/>

### Tennessee Homeless Education Program

Based on data from the National Center for Homeless Education, during the 2020-21 school year, 14,386 homeless students were served in Tennessee public schools, down from 18,482 during the 2019-20 school year. Of the 14,386 students served, 38 were migratory children, 1,109 unaccompanied homeless youth, 2,526 children with disabilities and 1,531 limited English proficient students (Fig 34).

The figure below offers an infographic from the November 2020 report issued by the [Early Childhood Homelessness in the United States: 50- State Profile](#) the Administration of Children and Families, using data 20 US Department of Education Data. The report indicates that in Tennessee over 12,500 children under the age of 6 were identified as homeless.



## Communication and Transportation

### Access to Computers

In 2017, the U.S. Census Bureau added computer device ownership data to its five-year estimates. In the United States and Tennessee, approximately 9 out of 10 households have more than one computing device (ex. desktop or laptop computers, smartphones or tablets). In the MCCAA service area, between 85.1 percent (Trousdale County) and 97.7 percent (Williamson County) of households have more than one computing device (Fig36).

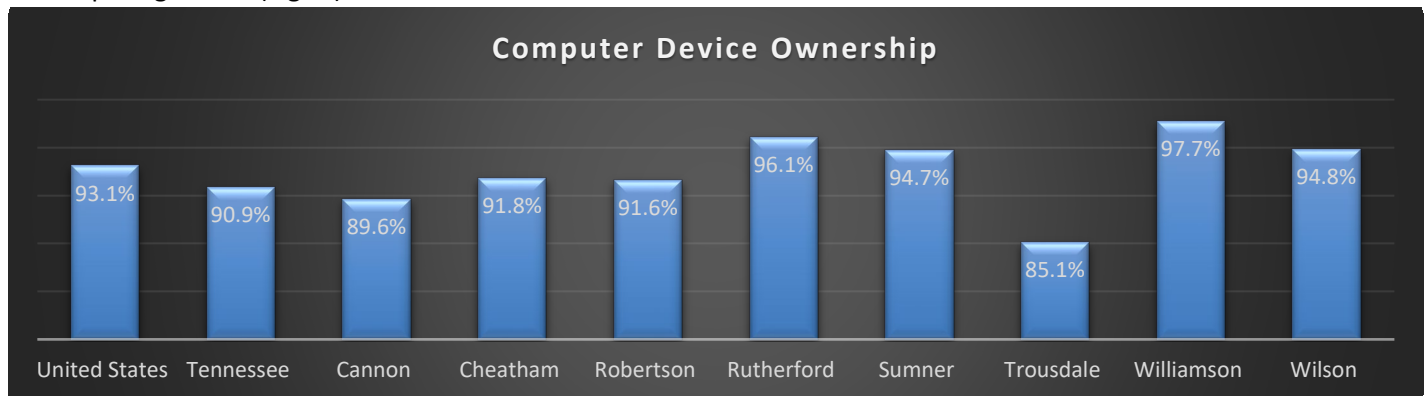


Figure 33: Computer Device Ownership (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)

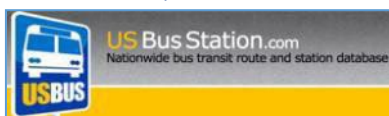
### Vehicle Ownership

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## Disabilities

### U.S. Census

Data from the U.S. Census Bureau indicate that 12.6 percent of the civilian noninstitutionalized population in the United States, and 15.3 percent in Tennessee, have a disability. More than 130,000 children under the age of 5 have a disability in the United States (0.7 percent), of which 3,549 are children under age 5 in Tennessee (0.9 percent of total children under 5). In the MCCA service area, between 7.2 and 19.8 percent of the civilian noninstitutionalized population have a disability. Approximately 294 children under the age of 5 reportedly have a disability in the MCCA service area (Table 35).

### Tennessee Department of Education

Based on data collected from the [Tennessee Department of Education](#), in Tennessee almost 130,000 students with a diagnosed disability were enrolled in public schools, of which 19,796 were in the MCCA service area counties (Table 36).<sup>xxvi</sup> Cannon County schools reported the highest percentage of students with a diagnosed disability, 16 percent of the student body; Robertson and Rutherford County schools reported the lowest, 9.8 percent.

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#### Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)

The nation's special education law is called the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, or IDEA. IDEA defines the term "child with a disability" in order to make special education and related services available to children with disabilities in public schools and Head Start programs. That definition includes specific disability terms, which are also defined by IDEA.

The **Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)** is a law that makes available a free appropriate public education to eligible children with disabilities throughout the nation and ensures special education and related services to those children.

The IDEA governs how states and public agencies provide early intervention, special education, and related services to more than 6.5 million eligible infants, toddlers, children, and youth with disabilities.

Infants and toddlers, birth through age 2, with disabilities and their families receive early intervention services under **IDEA Part C**. Children and youth, ages 3 through 21, receive special education and related services under **IDEA Part B**.

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## Health and Wellness

### Leading Causes of Death

According to the [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention](#), the five leading causes of death Tennessee are diseases of the heart, malignant neoplasms, chronic lower respiratory diseases, accidents and Alzheimer's disease.<sup>xxix</sup> The death rate per 100,000 residents for diseases of the heart is 238.5, and 213 for malignant neoplasms (cancerous tumors) (Table 40).

The death rate for diseases of the heart is lower in each of the MCCAA service area counties than the state of Tennessee, with the exception of Cannon and Robertson Counties, where the death rate is 351.7 and 240.8 per 100,000 residents, respectively (Table 40, Fig 37). The death rate for malignant neoplasms is lower in each of the MCCAA service area counties than the state of Tennessee, with the exception of Cannon and Cheatham Counties, where the death rates are 239.2 and 233.1 per 100,000 residents, respectively.

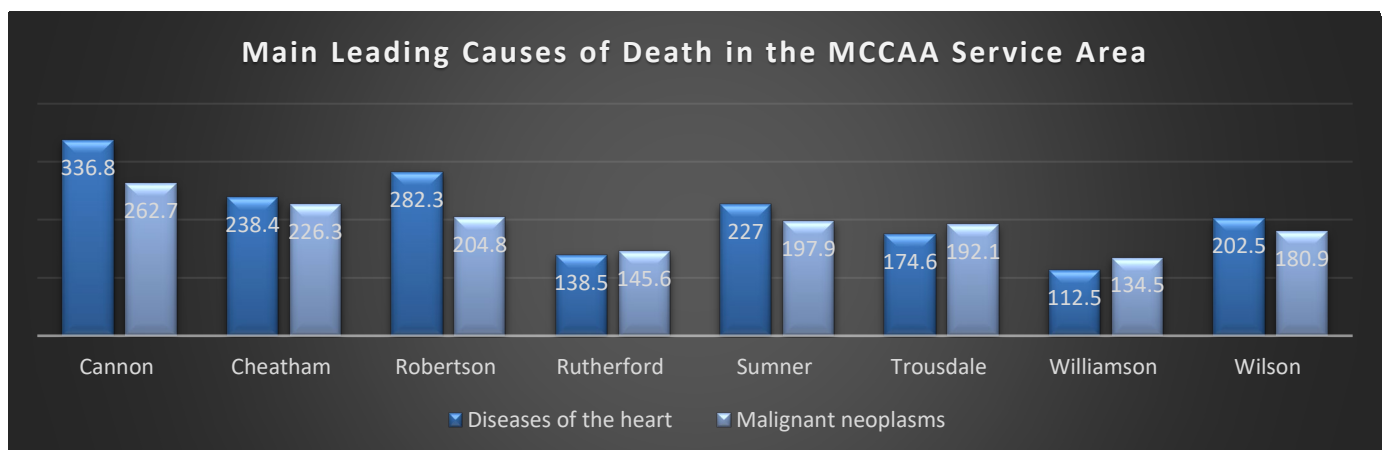


Figure 34: Top 2 Leading Causes of Death in TN and the Mid-Cumberland Service Area (2020)

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#### County Health Rankings

The County Health Rankings are based on a model that focuses on the factors, which if improved, can make communities healthier places to live. Its health outcomes measure mortality and morbidity, or the length of time people live, and the way people feel when they are alive. Health factors, which affect health outcomes, are measured on the following: health behaviors, clinical care, social and economic factors, and physical environment.

Tennessee's premature death rate (the years of potential life lost before age 75 per 100,000 residents) is 9,900. Of the 95 counties in Tennessee, Williamson County ranks 1<sup>st</sup> in Health Outcomes with a premature death rate of 3,800 and Trousdale County ranks 48<sup>th</sup> with a premature death rate of 9,800. Table 41 provides information on select health outcomes and health factors for Tennessee and the MCCAA service area. Each item is hyperlinked to the original source for additional explanation and data source.

The [County Health Rankings](#) is a collaboration between the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute that measures the health of nearly all counties in the nation and ranks them within states. The Rankings are compiled using county-level measures from a variety of national and state data sources. These measures are standardized and combined using scientifically informed weights.

### Health Insurance

Based on U.S. Census data, approximately one in 10 of the civilian noninstitutionalized population lacks health insurance in the United States and Tennessee. In the MCCAA service area, the percentage of the civilian noninstitutionalized population that lacks health insurance varies from 11.3 percent in Cannon County to 4.6 percent in Williamson County. Approximately 5.0 percent of children under the age of 18, and 4.2 percent of children under age 6, lack health insurance in Tennessee.

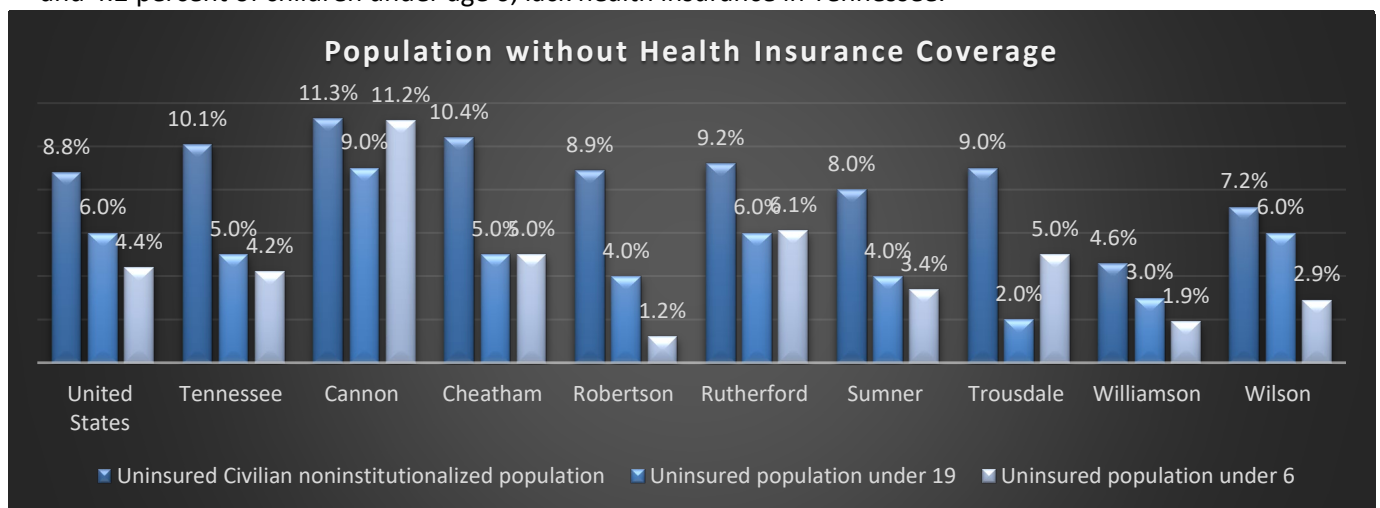


Figure 35: Health Insurance Coverage (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)

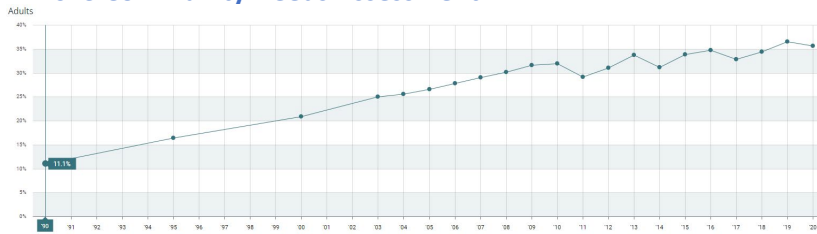
### Obesity

According to *The State of Obesity: Better Policies for a Healthier America 2018*, Tennessee has the 13<sup>th</sup> highest adult obesity rate in the nation, 35.6.<sup>xxxi</sup> Highest rates of obesity were seen for those ages 45-64 (38.5 percent), particularly among black/African American residents (46.4 percent) (Fig 39).



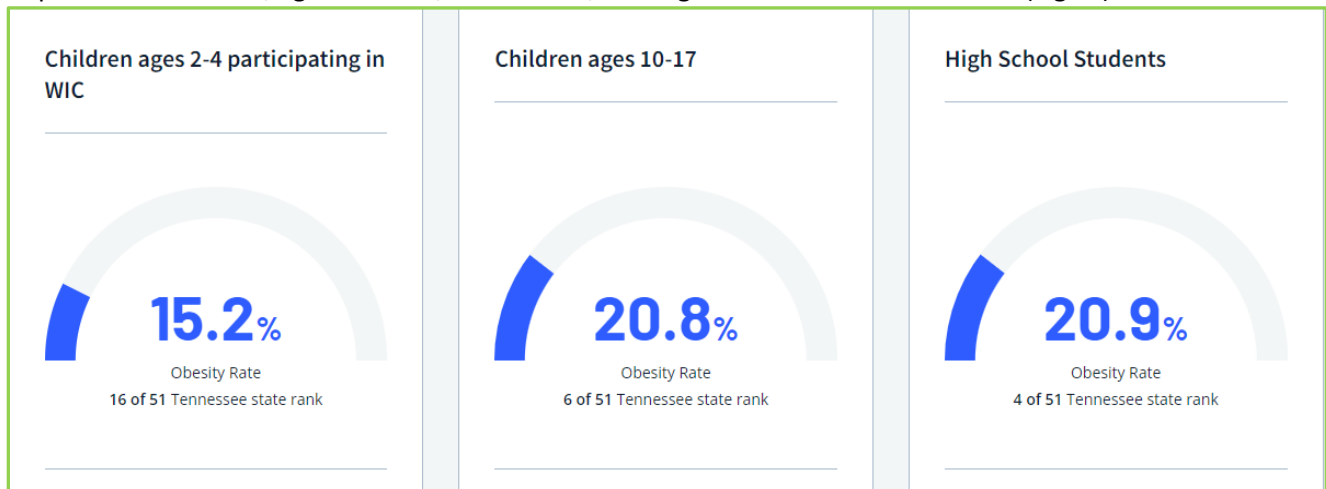
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**Figure 31: State of Obesity (2018 Report)**

The report also found that in 2018, 20.8 percent of Tennessee's high school students were obese or overweight, which ranks Tennessee 4th in the nation. Per the 2020 report, in 2018 15.2 percent of 2 to 4 year-olds from low-income families were obese, ranking the state 16<sup>th</sup> in the nation, and in 2017-18, 20.8 percent of children, ages 10 to 17, were obese, ranking Tennessee 6<sup>th</sup> in the nation (Fig 40).

Based on data provided to the [Annie E. Casey Kids Count Data Center](#) by the [Tennessee Department of Health, Division of Family Health and Wellness](#), in Tennessee over 7,000 children, ages 2 to 4, have a BMI that is greater than the 95<sup>th</sup> percentile for children of the same age and gender, accounting for 17.7 percent of all children, ages 2-4, receiving WIC services. In the MCCAA service area counties, a total of 673 children, ages 2 to 4, have a BMI that is greater than the 95<sup>th</sup> percentile for children of the same age and gender (Table 42).

## Oral Health

Dental disease is the most common chronic illness for children in the United States. Poor oral health in children and adults can lead to many health problems, ranging from tooth loss and gum disease to digestion problems and inflammation of major organs due to infection. Dental disease, decayed teeth,



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and/or missing teeth also affect self-esteem.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), more than one-quarter of children have tooth decay in baby teeth before entering kindergarten. By age 19, 68 percent of youth have experienced tooth decay in permanent teeth. As of 2016, 85 percent of children, ages 2 to 17, visited the dentist in the past year, and approximately 64 percent of adults, ages 18 to 64, and 65 and over, visited a dentist in the past year.

Childhood tooth decay disproportionately affects low-income families and racial or ethnic minorities. The rate of untreated dental caries in children from families with incomes below the poverty level is double that of nonpoor children. Access to affordable dental care is often the number one obstacle for low-income families.

Based on data collected from the [Data Resource Center for Child and Adolescent Health](#), approximately 76.9 percent of children in Tennessee were rated as having teeth in excellent or very good condition in 2021; this is similar to the nationwide average of 76.8 percent. The percentage of Tennessee children with no oral health problems in the past 12 months was 85.1, almost identical to the national average of 85.9 percent (Table 43).

## Maternal and Infant Health Data

### Fertility/Birth Rates

According to U.S. Census data, almost 4 million women, ages 15 to 50, gave birth in the U.S. in the past 12 months, a birth rate of 51 per 1,000 women. In Tennessee more than 82,000 women, ages 15 to 50, gave birth in the past 12 months, a birth rate of 51 per 1,000 women. In the MCCA service area combined,

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almost 11,000 women, ages 15 to 50, gave birth in the past 12 months. The birth rate per 1,000 women, ages 15 to 50, is highest in Trousdale County, with a rate of 146, and lowest in Cheatham County, 37. Overall, the birth rate for women, ages 20 to 34, is highest in all geographic regions studied; the highest rate is in Trousdale County, 261 (Table 45).

### Teen Pregnancy

Per the [Tennessee Department of Health](#), Tennessee's 2018 teen birth rate (per 1,000 females) is 0.4 for girls, ages 10-14, 11.6 for girls, ages 15-17, and 56.6 for girls, ages 18-19. In the MCCA service area, teen birth rates for girls, ages 10-14, are only provided for Cannon, Robertson, Rutherford and Sumner Counties, which range from 0.1 to 2.3 (Table 46).

Teen birth rates for girls, ages 15-17, are highest in Cannon County (24.5), followed by Robertson County (15.8) and Rutherford County (7.5). Teen birth rates for girls, ages 18-19, are highest in Sumner County (59.2) and Cheatham County (58.8), followed by Robertson County (57.1) all with a teen birth rate higher than the state rate (Fig 41).

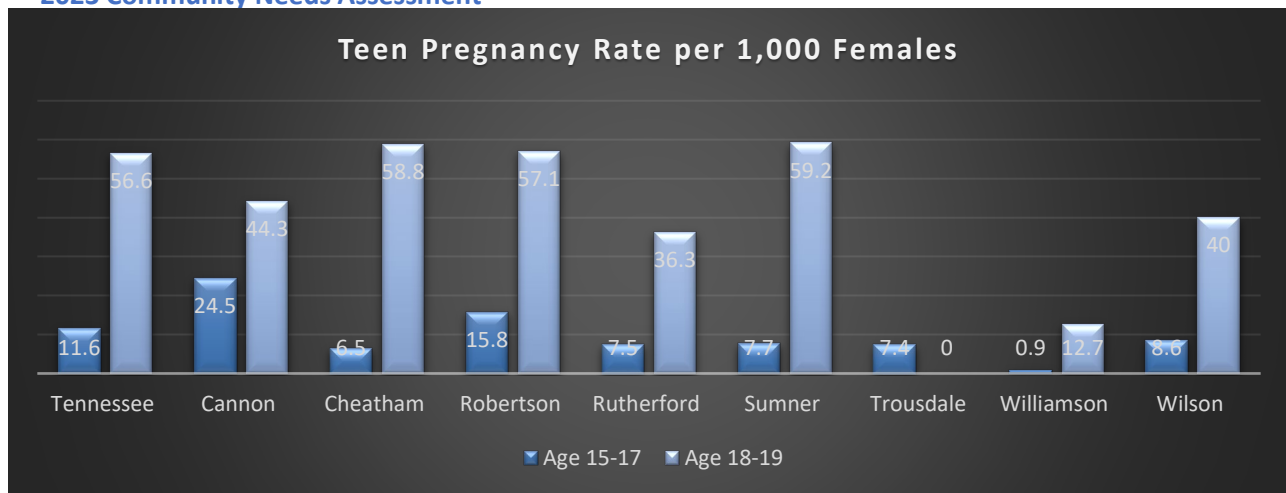


Figure 38: Teen Pregnancy Rates per 1,000 Females (2018)

### Prenatal Care

Based on data provided to the [Annie E. Casey Kids Count Data Center](#) by the [Tennessee Department of Health](#) (Office of Vital Records and Statistics), in Tennessee 73.9 percent of live births were to mothers who received adequate prenatal care (adequacy of care is based on the Kessner index). This represents a 16.5 percent increase from the 2017 report in the number of women receiving adequate prenatal care. In the MCCAA service area counties, between 73 and 81.2 percent of live births were to women who received adequate prenatal care (Table 27).

### Low Birthweight Babies

Per the Tennessee Department of Health, in 2018 in Tennessee there were more than 80,000 live births, of which, 7,471 were born with low birthweight (9.3 percent) and 1,304 with very low birthweight (1.6 percent)<sup>xxxix</sup>. In the MCCAA service area, between 3.3 (Trousdale County) and 11.6 (Cannon County) percent of infants were born with low birthweight, and between 0.8 (Trousdale County) and 2.3 (Cannon County) percent of infants were born with very low birthweight (Table 48).

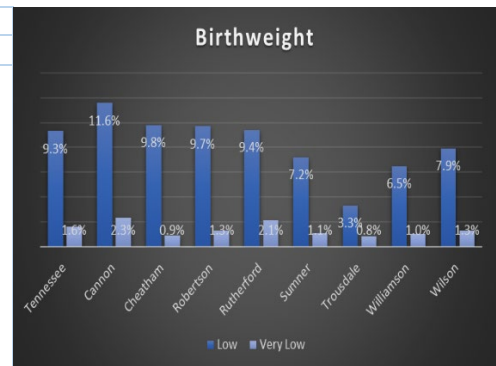

**Low birthweight** is defined as less than 2500 grams or 5 1/2 pounds. It is also common to classify low birthweight births into **moderately low birthweight** (1500-2499 grams) and **very low birthweight** (less than 1500 grams or 3 1/3 pounds). These classifications are useful because they often correspond to clinical characteristics - increasing morbidities or illnesses with decreasing birthweight. Babies born too small are often born too soon. ### Infant Mortality

Based on data provided to the [Annie E. Casey Kids Count Data Center](#) by the [Tennessee Department of Health](#) (Office of Vital Records and Statistics), in Tennessee 563 infants died in 2021, before reaching their first birthday, a rate of 7 per 1,000 live births. In the combined MCCA service area, 65 infants died before reaching their first birthday, with rates ranging from 3.6 (Williamson County) to 12 per 1,000 (Cannon County).

### Nutrition

#### Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

Based on data provided to the [Annie E. Casey Kids Count Data Center](#) by the [Tennessee Department of Human Services](#), more than 423,000 children under the age of 18 (28.2 percent) received federally funded food coupons under the SNAP program in Tennessee in 2018, of which more than 35,000 were in the MCCA service area (Table 50).<sup>xli</sup> In Williamson County only 3.4 percent of children under age 18 receive

The [Food and Nutrition Service \(FNS\)](#) is an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture established in 1969. FNS works to end hunger and obesity - the administration of 15 federal nutrition assistance programs including WIC, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and school meals. The program's mission is to increase food security and reduce hunger by providing children and low-income people access to food, a healthful diet and nutrition education in a way that supports American agriculture and inspires public confidence. No American should have to go hungry.

The [Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program \(SNAP\)](#) (formerly known as the Food Stamp Program) is designed to alleviate hunger and malnutrition by increasing the purchasing power of low-income households. SNAP offers nutrition assistance to millions of eligible, low-income individuals and families and provides economic benefits to communities. SNAP is the largest program in the domestic hunger safety net. The Food and Nutrition Service works with State agencies, nutrition educators, and neighborhood and faith-based organizations to ensure that those eligible for nutrition assistance can make informed decisions about applying for the program and can access benefits. FNS also works with State partners and the retail community to improve program administration and ensure program integrity.

The special supplemental nutrition program for [Women, Infants, and Children \(WIC\)](#) is a federal program providing support to low-income pregnant, nursing and non-nursing postpartum women and children, ages 0 to 5. The program is designed to provide supplemental foods, nutrition education, and referrals for health care services.

The [National School Lunch Program](#) is a federally assisted meal program operating in public and nonprofit private schools and residential child care institutions. It provides nutritionally balanced, low-cost or free lunches to children each school day. The program was established under the National School Lunch Act, signed by President Harry Truman in 1946.

### Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)



The special supplemental nutrition program for [Women, Infants, and Children \(WIC\)](#) is a federal program providing support to low-income pregnant, nursing and non-nursing postpartum women and children, ages 0 to 5. The program is designed to provide supplemental foods, nutrition education, and referrals for health care services. As of December 2018, the average monthly WIC participation in Tennessee reached 124,894. Approximately 43 percent of WIC recipients in Tennessee are children (54,205), 27 percent are women (33,721) and 30 percent are infants (36,968).

Based on data provided to the [Annie E. Casey Kids Count Data Center](#) by the [Tennessee Department of Health](#) (WIC Division), in 2017 more than 120,000 children under the age of 5 (29.6 percent) received WIC benefits in Tennessee, of which almost 10,000 were in the MCCAA service area counties (Table 51).<sup>xliii</sup>

### National School Lunch Program

The Tennessee School Nutrition Program provides meals to low-income children attending public and private schools, as well as residential and child care institutions. The School Nutrition Program administers the USDA's National School Lunch Program, School Breakfast Program, and Afterschool Snack Program across the state. During the 2017 school year, more than 464,000 children, or 49.2 percent of the total student body, participated in the free/reduced-price lunch program. In the combined MCCAA service area, 43,422 students participated in the free/reduced-price school lunch program, between 9 and 48.1 percent of the counties' student populations (Table 52).<sup>xliv</sup>

### Food Insecurity

Food deprivation and its measure are often referred to as *Food Insecurity*. The USDA defines food insecurity as meaning “consistent access to adequate food is limited by a lack of money and other resources at times during the year.” In the U.S., more than one in five children live in a household in which they do not always know where they will find their next meal.



An estimated 12.9 million children under the age of 18 in the U.S. live in homes that are unable to consistently access enough and nutritious foods, a rate of 17.5%.<sup>xlvi</sup> In Tennessee 14.5 percent of the total population lives without access to enough and nutritious foods. The food insecurity rate for children is even higher, 19.7 percent, which accounts for more than 295,000 children (Fig 42).

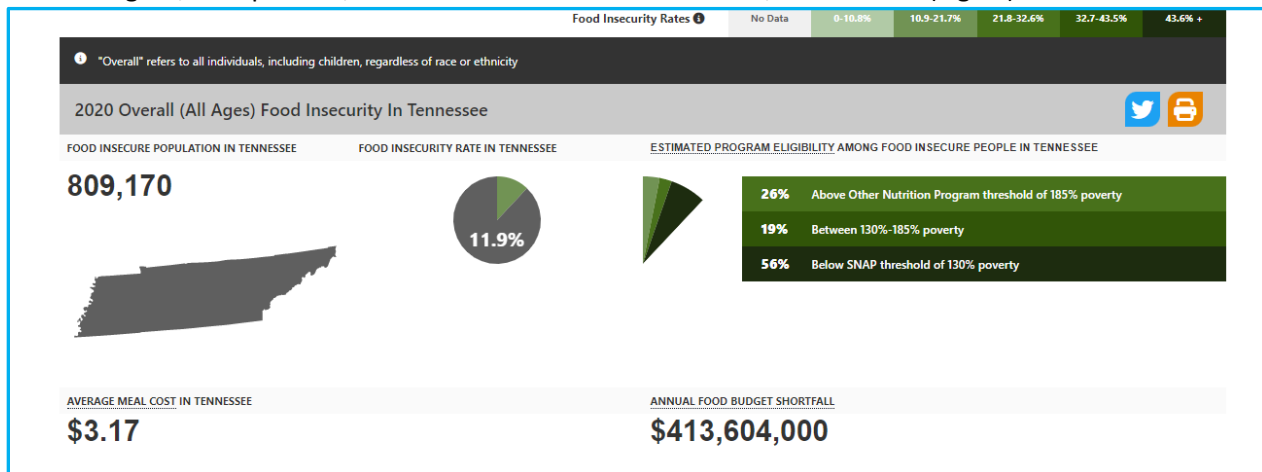


Figure 39: Food Insecurity in Tennessee (2016)

The overall food insecurity in the MCCAA service area ranges from 7 percent (Williamson County) to 12.7 percent (Trousdale County). All counties in the MCCAA service are have a lower child food insecurity rate than Tennessee (19.2 percent), except Cannon County (20.1 percent). In the combined MCCAA service area there are 35,750 children who experience food insecurity (Table 53).<sup>xlvii</sup>

**Average Meal Cost:** The national average dollar amount food-secure people report spending per week on food, as estimated in the Current Population Survey (CPS), divided by 21 (assuming three meals eaten per day). This number is then adjusted by the cost of food index.

#### Food Deserts

Food deserts are defined as “urban neighborhoods and rural towns without ready access to fresh, healthy, and affordable food. Instead of supermarkets and grocery stores, these communities may have no food access, or are served only by fast food restaurants and convenience stores that offer few healthy, affordable food options.” A 1-mile marker is used in densely populated urban areas, while a 10-mile marker is used in more sparsely populated rural areas. In the United States it is estimated that 23.5 million people live in food deserts, of which 13.5 million are low-income families.



The USDA, Treasury, and HHS have defined a food desert as a census tract with a substantial share of residents who live in low-income areas that have low levels of access to a grocery store or healthy, affordable food retail outlet. Census tracts qualify as food deserts if they meet low-income and low-access thresholds:

1. They qualify as "**low-income communities**," based on having: a) a poverty rate of 20 percent or greater, OR b) a median family income at or below 80 percent of the area median family income; AND
2. They qualify as "**low-access communities**," based on the determination that at least 500 persons and/or at least 33 percent of the census tract's population live more than one mile from a supermarket or large grocery store (10 miles, in the case of non-metropolitan census tracts).

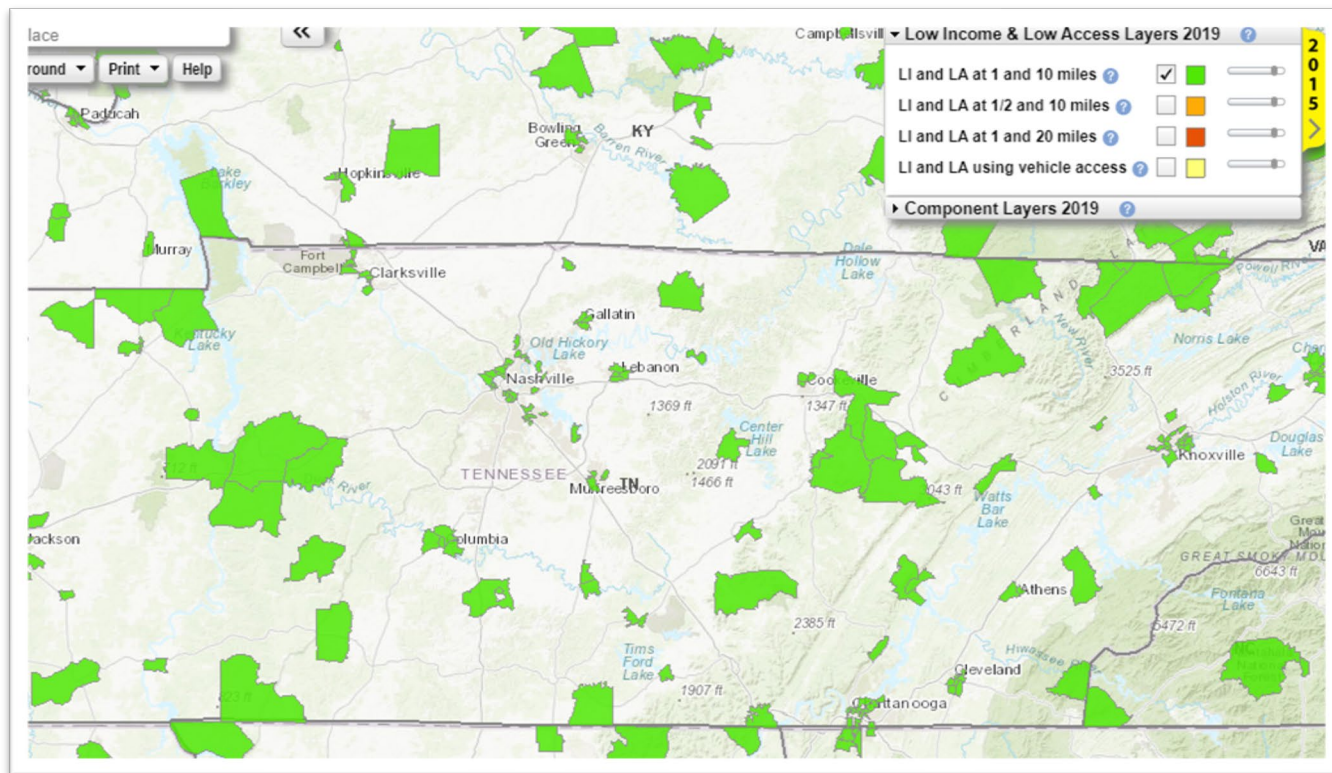


Figure 40: Food Access in Tennessee (2021)

**Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs)** are a significant risk factor for substance use disorders and can impact prevention efforts. Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) are stressful or traumatic events, including abuse and neglect. They may also include household dysfunction such as witnessing domestic violence or growing up with family members who have [substance use disorders](#). ACEs are strongly related to the development and prevalence of a wide range of health problems throughout a person's lifespan, including those associated with substance misuse. ### Safety and Crime

According to the [Tennessee Bureau of Investigation](#), in Tennessee more than 506,000 crimes were reported in 2021, of which almost 49,000 crimes were in the MCCAA service area. Table 54 provides details on the crimes reported, represented in three broad categories: crimes against persons, crimes against property and crimes against society. 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#### Prevalence of Drug and/or Alcohol Abuse

Based on data from the [Tennessee Department of Health](#), in Tennessee there were 3,805 overdose deaths in 2021, of which 3,038 were opioid overdose deaths. The number and rate of drug overdose deaths has more than doubled from 2017 to 2021; see Fig 43.

The Tennessee Department of Health Office of Informatics and Analytics developed a [comprehensive dashboard](#), illustrating Tennessee's drug overdose data by county. Based on data found on this dashboard, in the MCCAA service area counties there were 417 drug overdose deaths in 2021, of which 344 were opioid drug overdose deaths (Table 55).

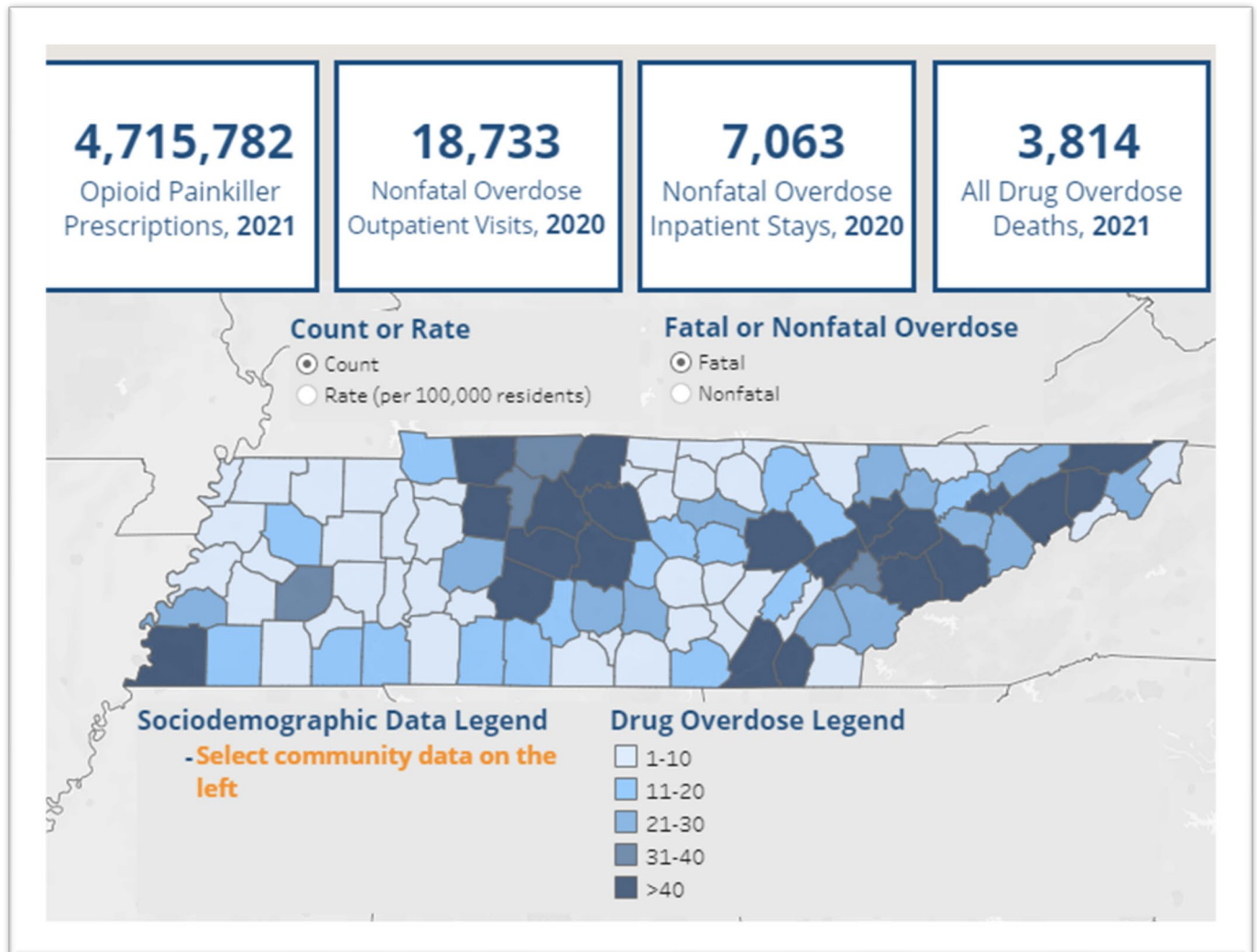


Figure 41: Tennessee Service Area Drug Overdose Deaths (2021)

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#### Child Abuse and Neglect

Based on data collected from the [Annie E. Casey Kids Count Data Center](#), in 2022 there were 70,350 reported cases of child abuse and neglect in Tennessee, accounting for 4.6 percent of the total population under the age of 18; the number and percent were down from the 72,805 (4.9 percent) reported in 2021.<sup>li</sup> In the combined MCCAA service area, there were 7,916 reported cases of child abuse in 2022, up from 7,848 in 2021 (Table 56). Percentages remained lower however, due to increase in overall population.

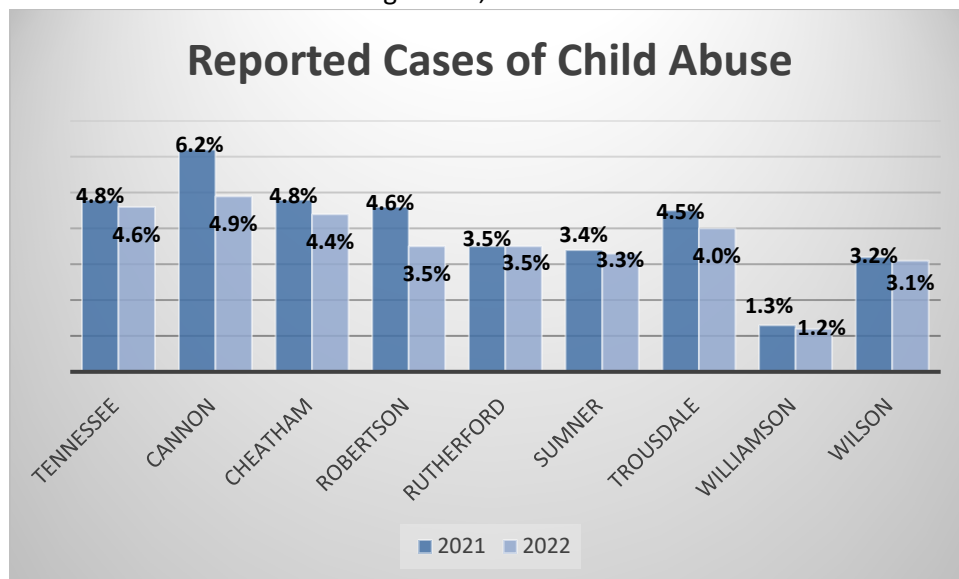


Figure 42: Reported Cases of Child Abuse (2018)

### Cost of Child Care

Based on information from the TN Child Care Task Force Final Report, issued in December of 2022, the average annual price for families in center-based full-time child care was more than \$11,501.87 for infants, and \$9,742.50 for 4-year-olds. A family living at or below 30 percent of area median income in Tennessee, which is considered very low income, is paying almost half of their available income for care for a single infant child, and over 40 percent for care for a 4-year-old. The MCCAA service area is little better with 39.6 percent of income for care for a single infant, and 33.6 percent for care for a single 4-year-old.

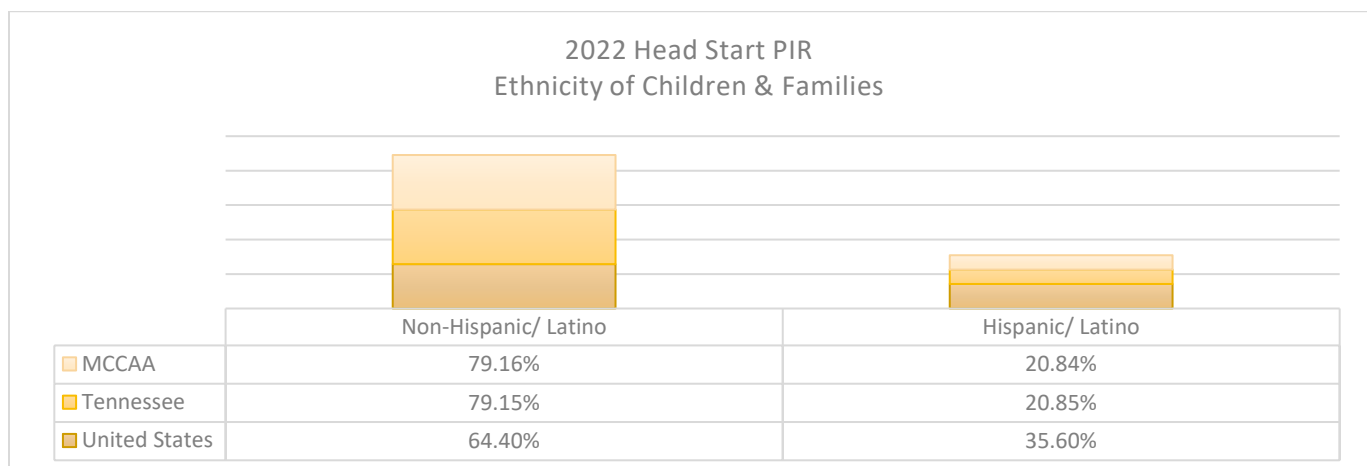




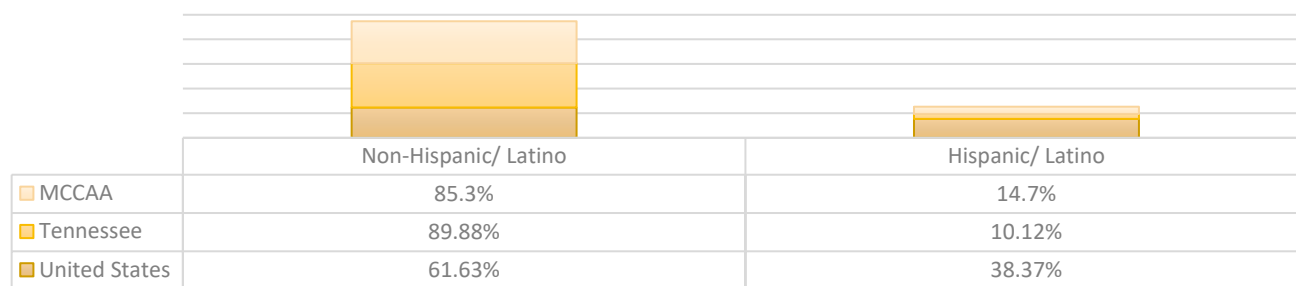
## Race of Children and Families (Non-Hispanic Only)

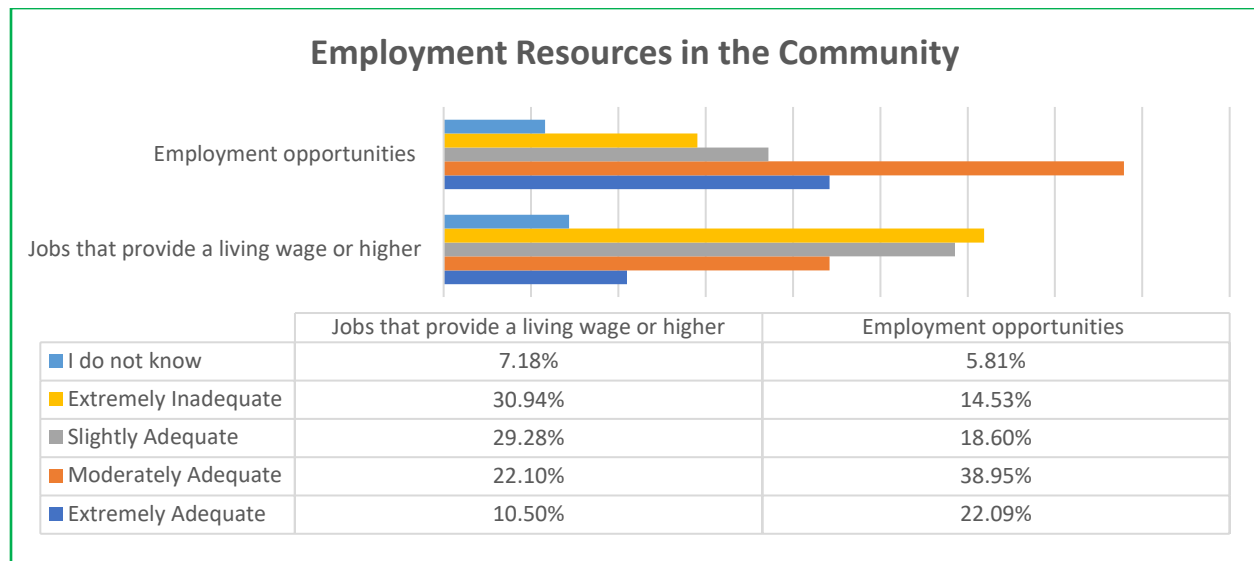

Although a combined 61.04 percent of survey participants indicated that Employment Opportunities are Extremely Adequate or Moderately Adequate in their communities, 60.22 percent indicated that jobs with Living Wages are Slightly or Extremely Inadequate. The same participants indicated that Employment Opportunities and Jobs that provide a living wage are Extremely or Moderately Important. This indicates that although Employment Opportunities are available, the employment options do not provide enough income to support a family, which is extremely important to the community.

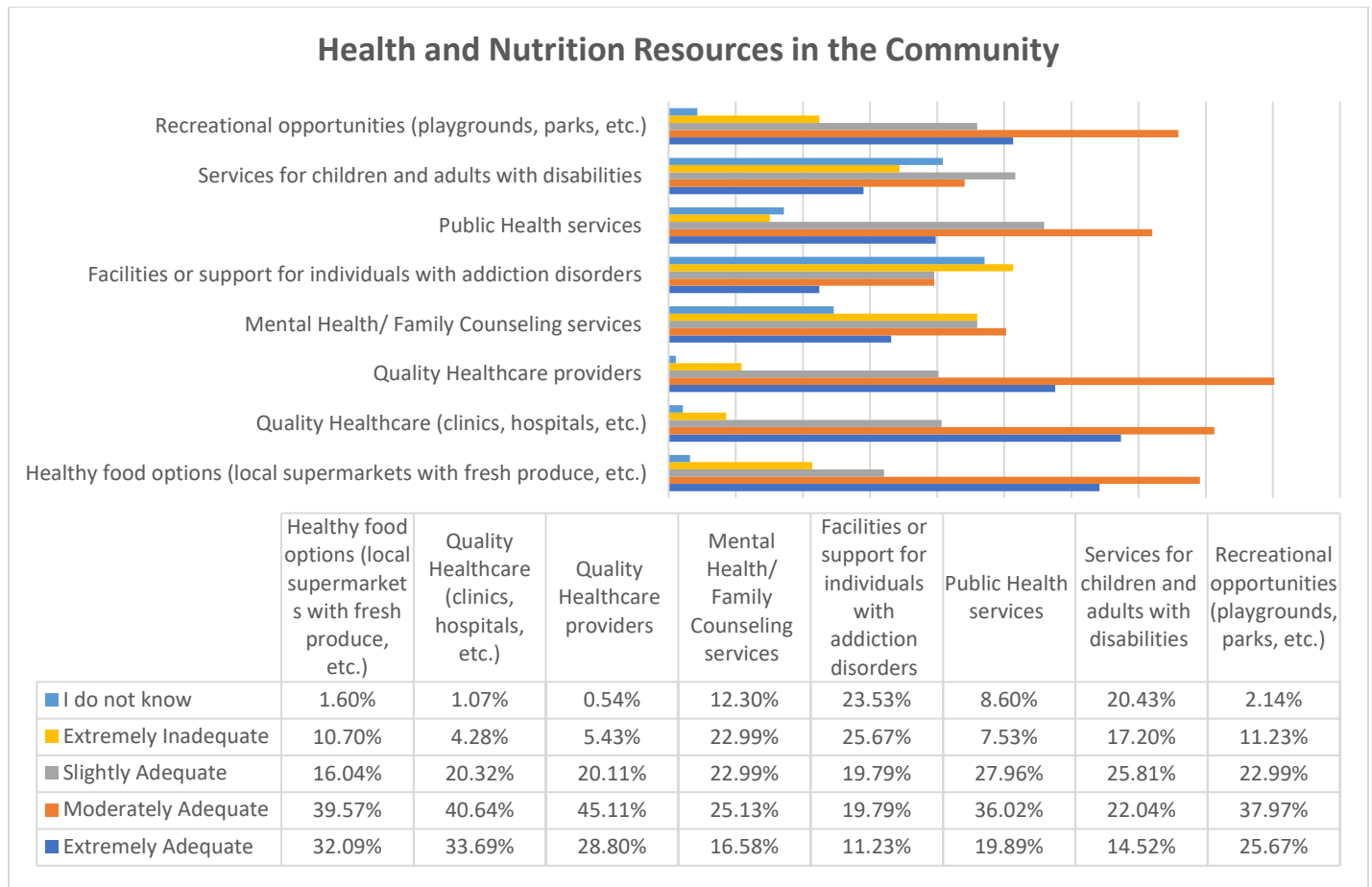

Resources such as Health Food options, Quality Healthcare and Healthcare providers, and Recreational Opportunities are indicated as being Extremely Adequate or Moderately Adequate by community members, with each category scoring 60 percent or higher. However, Mental Health, Addiction treatment, and Services for Children with Disabilities scored much lower with 45.98 percent, 45.46, and 43.01 percent respectively indicating that resources for these issues are not adequate. It is worth noting that each of these resources also had a higher than normal percentage of participants indicating that they did not know about resources. Translated, these results illustrate that our communities are lacking needed Mental Health and Addiction Disorder resources. According to Tennessee's 2022 County Health rankings, Tennessee has a mental health provider ration of 590:1. In the MCCAA service area this ratio ranges from 1,050:1 in Sumner County to 10,910:0 in Trousdale County. Of the eight-county service area, only Williamson County is above the state ratio with a 490:1 provider to individual rate.

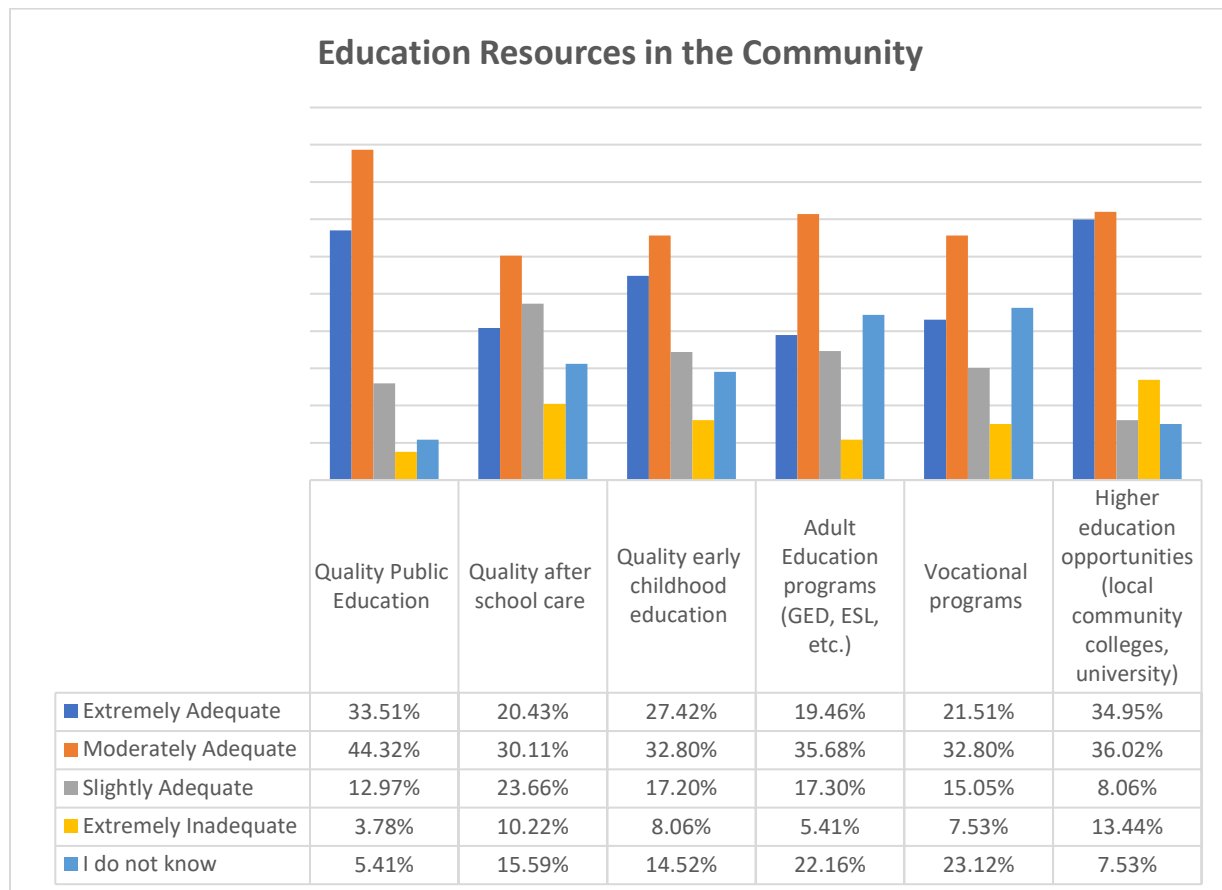

An overwhelming 77.8 percent of survey respondents indicated that the Public Education system(s) in their communities were extremely or moderately accurate. Additionally, 71 percent indicated that there were Extremely or Moderately Adequate Higher Education opportunities. The MCCAA service area is home to several higher education systems including Middle Tennessee State University, Cumberland University, Volunteer State Community College, and other institutions of higher learning. Most of these institutions participate in the TNPromise scholarship, which provides tuition to obtain an Associate's degree or vocational certification to qualified students graduating in Tennessee school. Additionally, Tennessee offers the TNReconnect program which provides tuition assistant to non-degreed adult learners to obtain an Associate's degree or vocational certification. Furthermore, The Tennessee College of Applied Technology, or TCAT, is a state-wide system of schools that provide high quality technical training for in-demand fields such as mechatronics, tool and die, and practical nursing.

Over 60 percent of respondents reported that they did have access to Extremely or Moderately Adequate Early Childhood Education, with many naming the Head Start/ Early Head Start program specifically.



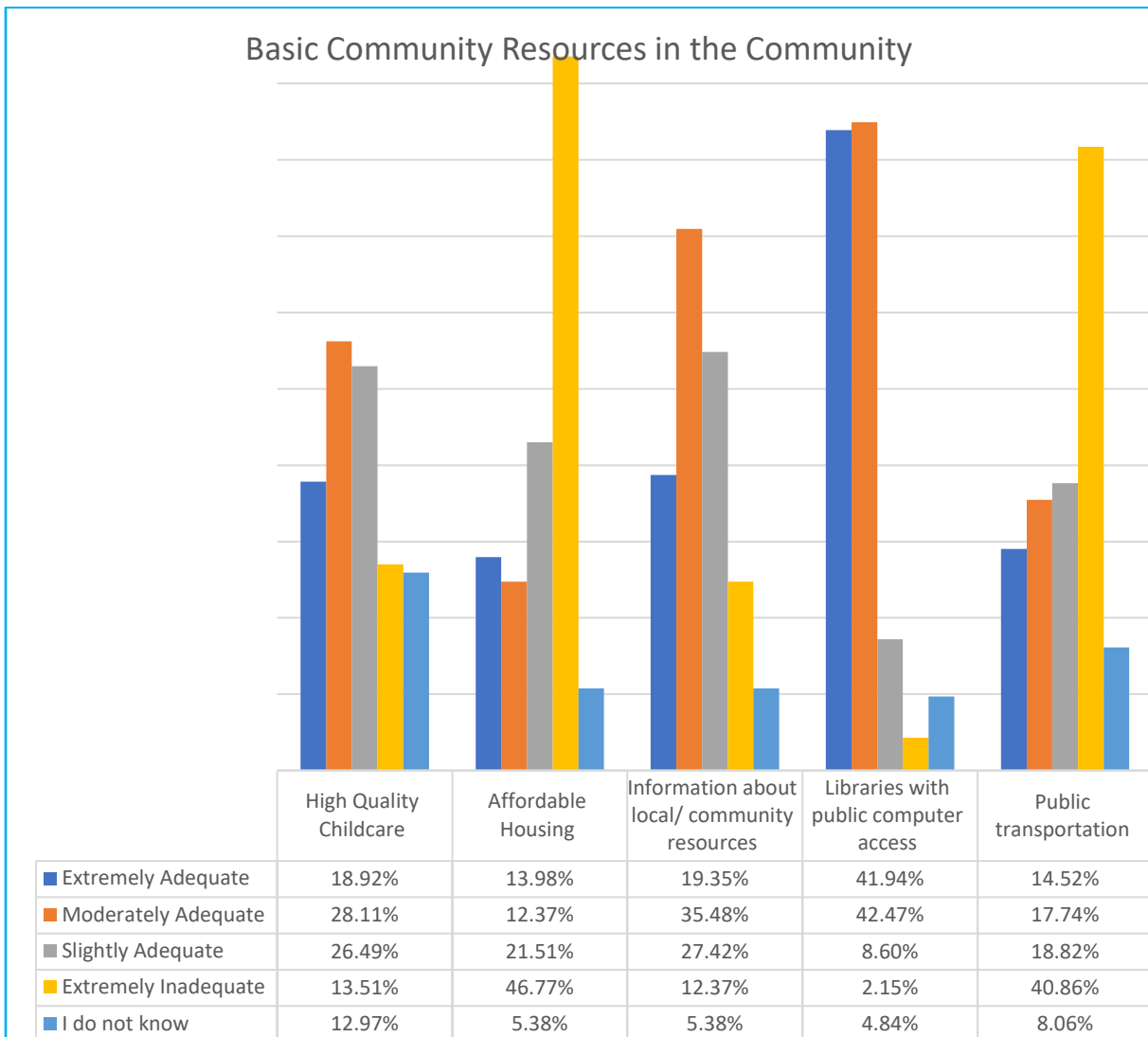

Affordable housing has been the number one need in the MCCAA service area for several years now. As real estate prices in the Nashville Metro area continue to rise to astronomical levels, MCCAA's eight county service area has been the destination for middle- and lower-income families seeking housing relief. Unfortunately, the housing market has also drastically affected the cost of housing in these communities as well. The affordable housing issue is clearly reflected in our survey results with over 68 percent of respondents indicating the Affordable Housing resources are slightly or extremely inadequate in their communities. Historically, the guideline for rent or mortgage is that it should be no greater than 30 percent of the household gross income. However, as the data in the Needs Assessment document illustrates, individuals earning minimum wages would need to work 133 hours or more a week to afford the average rental price in the MCCAA service area. The affordable housing crisis combined with the lack of available transportation creates an environment that results in families struggling to thrive.

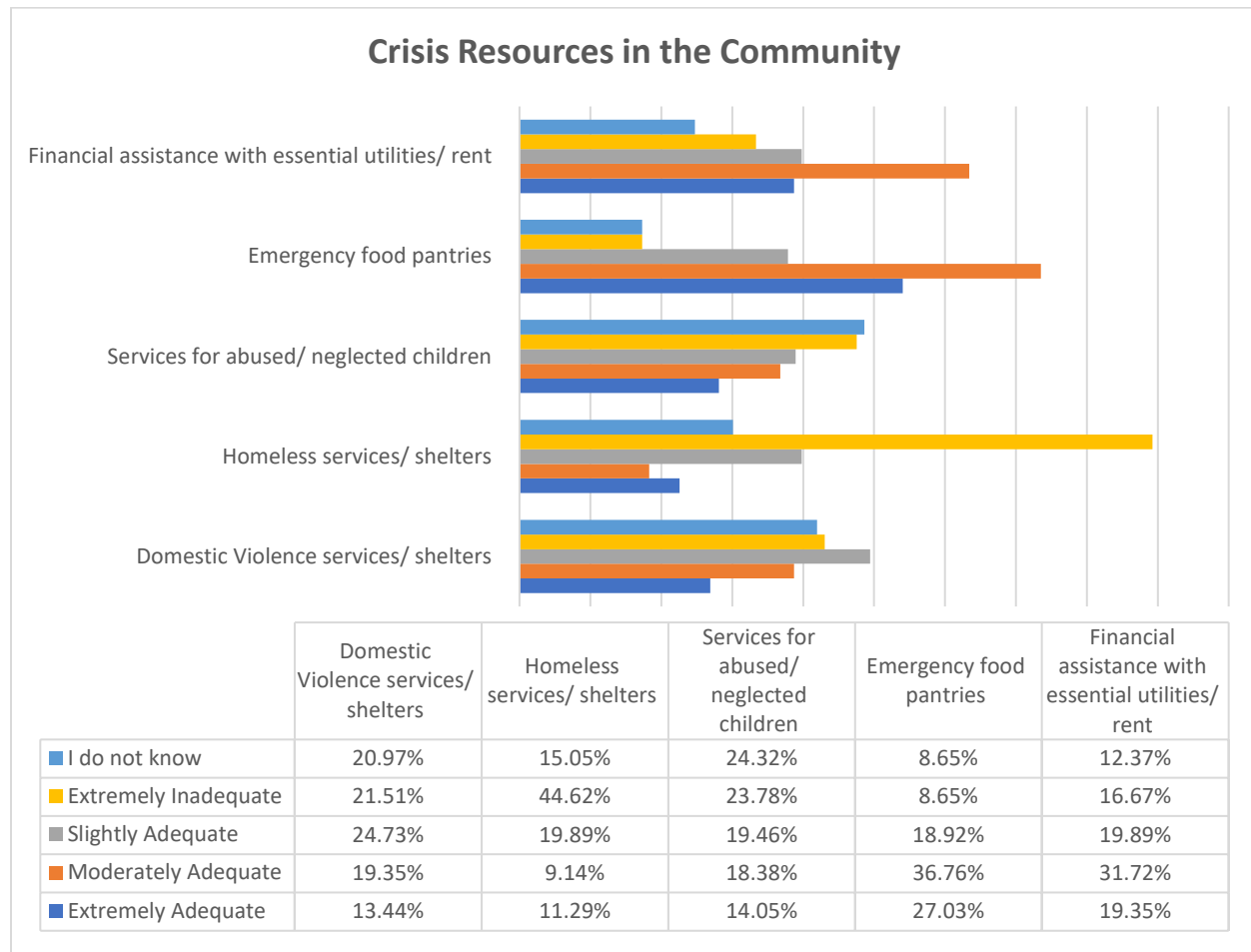

Unsurprisingly, 64.5 percent of survey participants overwhelmingly indicated that their communities lacked resources for the homeless population. Although all service counties belong to a HUD Continuum of Care, resources do not seem to be readily available or adequate enough to meet the need for service. Counties also seem to be lacking in resources for victims of Domestic Violence. Only 32.5 percent of survey participants indicated that resources for victims of Domestic Violence were Extremely or Moderately Adequate within their community.

Another interesting finding is that 51.1 percent of respondents indicated that there are Extremely or Moderately Adequate resources for people needing housing or utility assistance. However, the same respondents indicated in the SWOT analysis portion of the survey that more assistance is needed due to inflation and the rising cost of basic essentials for living. This would seem to indicate that appropriate programs exist, but available funding is inadequate.

A final consideration is that community size affects the availability of resources. Smaller communities such as Cheatham, Robertson, or Trousdale counties struggle with resource availability in comparison to larger communities such as Rutherford or Sumner counties.

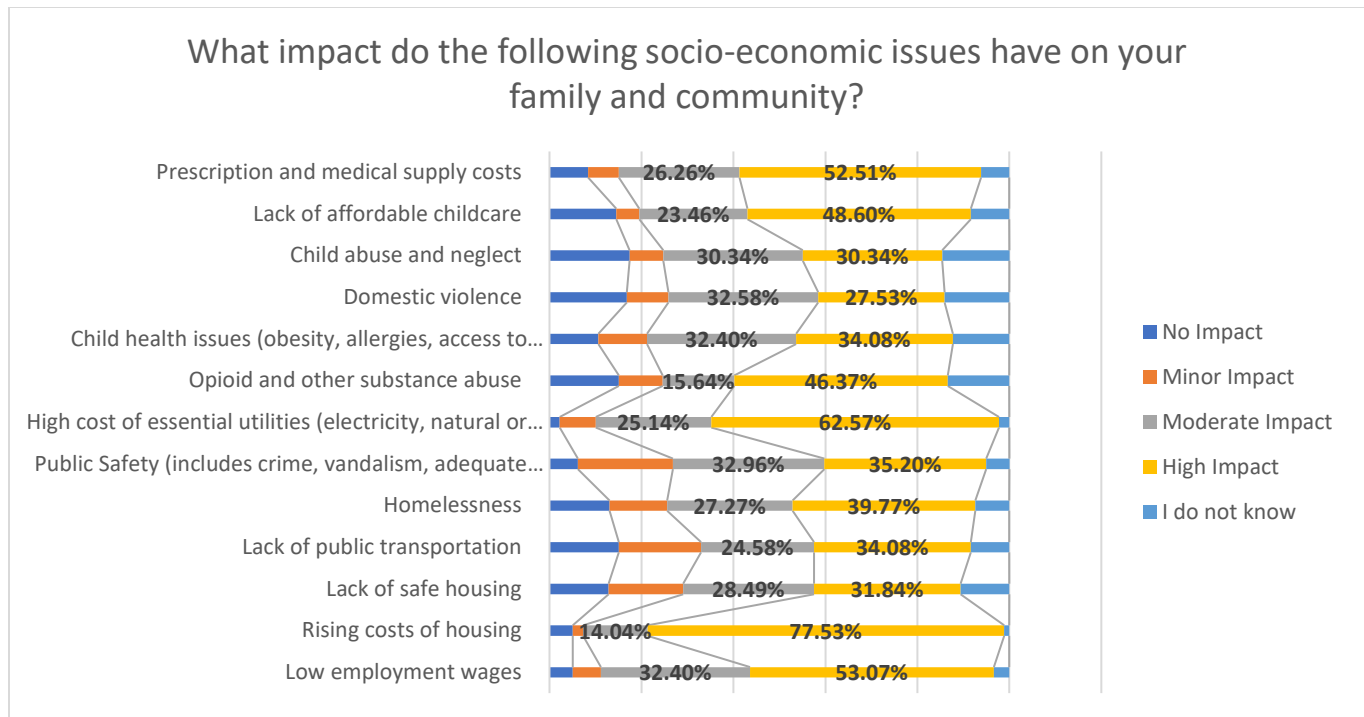
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#### Socio- Economic Issues

When asked 'what impact do the following socio-economic issues have on your family and community' over 91 percent of survey participants indicated that the Rising Cost of Housing was having a Moderate to High impact on their community. This was closely followed by 87.61 percent of participants that indicated that the high cost of essential utilities has affected their family or community. Another 85.5 percent indicated that employment wages were not high

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enough to keep pace with the rising costs of housing and essentials. These results are consistent throughout the participant survey and indicate that households in the MCCAA service area are currently struggling to keep up with rising costs and flat wages.
